## Man gets six years in slaying

□ Angel Loya pleaded to voluntary manslaughter.

PORTALES — Angel Loya was sentenced Wednesday morning to six years in prison after pleading guilty to voluntary manslaughter in connection with the April 2018 shooting death of Dylan McKay in Portales.

"I'm truly sorry for what happened," Loya told McKay's loved ones in the crowded court hearing. "It was never my intention to take Dylan's life."

Loya, 23, faced up to 15 years in prison if convicted at trial on his original charge of second-degree murder. Attorneys said in Wednesday's plea conference that they agreed to the amended charge since a jury "by and large would have a wide variety of opinions as to what should happen," defense counsel Gary Mitchell told the court.

Mitchell said the case was an unusual one, "certainly not murder, and more likely than not, not self defense."

Deputy District Attorney Jake Boazman said Loya knew McKay "was upset and on his way to the residence," but made "no attempt to contact law enforcement ... but instead armed himself with the firearm" and stood behind the door of the residence where the incident took place.

The mother of McKay's daughter read an emotional statement to the court, emphasizing how her daughter has been impacted by McKay's loss.

"I hope that everyone involved in this remembers every day how it has affected a little girl for a lifetime," Bradi Carthel said of her daughter, Braylan.

"Everything that could go wrong went wrong that night, and it went wrong worse

## One piece at a time

□ Work on pipeline project scheduled to wrap up by year's end.

CLOVIS — Fifty-foot steel pipe segments, arriving four at a time on trucks from Dallas, are now being installed in the ongoing construction of the Eastern New Mexico Water Utility Authority's interim ground-water project that broke ground in

February.

Work on Finished Water 2 is scheduled to wrap up by year's end, establishing almost 8 miles of transmission pipeline between northwest of Cannon Air Force Base and EPCOR's water storage system at Martin Luther King Jr Boulevard and Brady Avenue. With a price tag of \$28.6 million, it is phase one of the Interim Ground Water Project that will eventually create lateral connections among ENMWUA's eight member communities and CAFB.

If things stay on schedule the

pipeline should be functional for local service by early next year, ENMWUA secretary and Curry County Commissioner Robert Thornton previously told The News.

Additional phases are down the line — Finished Water III will one day make a similar push south from CAFB to finished water tanks in Portales, and the IGWP will eventually be connected north to Quay County's Ute Reservoir for a "16,450 acre-foot annual supply of renewable surface water."

## Moments in time

THE HISTORY CHANNEL

• On **June 9, 1772**, colonists, angered by the British Parliament's passing of the Townshend Acts restricting colonial trade, board and set ablaze the HMS Gaspee, an armed British customs schooner that had run aground. British officials found no one willing to identify those involved, and the inquiry closed without result.

• On **June 4, 1919**, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, guaranteeing women the right to vote, is passed by Congress and sent to the states for ratification. On Aug. 18, 1920, Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the amendment, giving it the two-thirds majority necessary to make it the law of the land.

• On **June 3, 1937**, the duke of Windsor — formerly King Edward VIII — marries Wallis Warfield Simpson, the American divorcee for whom he abdicated the British throne in 1936.

• On **June 5, 1942**, President Franklin D. Roosevelt issues a stern statement warning Japan to stop using poison gas in its war on China. Japan continued its use of these weapons until the end of the war, managing to keep its activities secret.

• On **June 8, 1966**, the rival National Football League (NFL) and American Football League (AFL) announce that they will merge. The first Super Bowl between the two leagues took place at the end of the 1966 season.

• On **June 6, 1971**, “The Ed Sullivan Show” airs for the last time, 23 years after its 1948 premiere. Gladys Knight and the Pips were the musical guests.

• On **June 7, 2002**, Michael Skakel is convicted in the 1975 murder of his former neighbor, 15-year-old Martha Moxley, with a golf club. Skakel, a nephew of Ethel Kennedy, the wife of the late U.S. Senator Robert Kennedy, was sentenced to 20 years to life in prison. In 2018, the Connecticut Supreme Court vacated the conviction and ordered a new trial.

# Committee hopes to hire surveyors

CLOVIS — Come this fall, you may notice a few new faces around town surveying Clovis' roads in search of repair needs.

But in all honesty, you probably won't notice.

The Clovis Public Works Committee took in a presentation from Pittsburgh-based RoadBotics during its Wednesday meeting, and seemed impressed with the process and potential benefits.

Established in December 2016, RoadBotics has delivered road assessments to 75 municipalities and has worked with 20 different states and 10 different countries.

Brian Felker, director of sales, gave a presentation by showing the data collection process from an assignment in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The 90-day process starts with a municipality providing RoadBotics with a map, which Clovis staff could provide in a matter of minutes with its geographic information system (GIS) software. RoadBotics then calculates the total mileage and plans a trip for a few survey drivers.

Those surveyors rent vehicles, mount a smartphone in the cabin and drive the municipality's streets. The phone, running RoadBotics'

proprietary app, photographs every 10 feet of roadway. The company's software analyzes every photo and identifies the road segment's overall condition and any distresses. The segmenting is helpful, Felker said, because a road may be great on balance but have a glaring problem for 20 or 30 feet.

The software primarily analyzes concrete and asphalt, and distinguishes between each, with Felker adding, "It's been trained to tell the difference between a concrete joint and a crack."

The software doesn't evaluate brick, dirt or gravel roads, Felker said, but most clients want those roads included in the survey for data collection purposes.

Public Works Director Clint Bunch said he's hopeful to have RoadBotics' services included in the 2019-20 city budget. The information the surveys would provide, he said, would save staff time and help prioritize road repairs.

"We'd know what ones need to be patched, and what ones need to be chip-sealed," Bunch said. "When somebody calls me about a road, I could assess the problem from my desk in most cases."

Felker said having the photographs has proven useful to municipalities for inventory or sometimes for prioritizing projects based on how many driveways are in a neighborhood.

In one instance, Felker said, a city saved itself a legal battle. A resident complained to the city a construction project damaged his driveway, but thanks to the survey the city had a time-stamped photo showing his driveway was damaged prior to construction.

Bunch felt the outside assessment would be the biggest benefit.

"Every commissioner here has a road in their district they think needs work," Bunch said. "We may have to tell you that street is better off than others. It takes out the subjectivity."

RoadBotics charges \$90 per mile — a \$24,300 expense based on in-meeting estimates of 270 miles of city roads. Bunch asked if the city could piggyback off of other New Mexico contracts because any expense over \$20,000 would require a sealed bid process.

Felker said Clovis would be RoadBotics' first New Mexico client, but said multi-year agreements would kick in discounts that could take Clovis below the \$20,000 price point. Bunch said he could put that expense into the upcoming 2019-20 budget, but ensuing years would be the city commission's decision every year.

In other business before the committee:

■ Bunch asked each of the commissioners on the committee — Ladona Clayton in District 1, Gary

Elliott in District 2, Fidel Madrid in District 3 and Public Works Committee Chair Chris Bryant in District 4 — to give him a list of roads in their districts that needed paving improvements.

■ Bunch said speed flashers have been installed at Clovis Christian Schools and on Echols Avenue, with the first to be functional next school year and the latter operating now. Madrid said he's driven by the Echols flashers already and has seen motorists slow down each time.

A recent city application, Bunch said, was made to the New Mexico Department of Transportation to fund a roundabout at Humphrey and N.M. 523 just north of the CCS campus. Clayton, superintendent for CCS, said she looked back at board meetings and confirmed the board approved an easement for a roundabout in August 2017.

■ Madrid asked Bunch if it would be possible to raise the speed limit on Seventh Street, noting motorists rarely stay under the posted 35 mph limit.

"If you drive 35," Madrid said, "they'll leave you standing still."

Bunch had no issue with Madrid's assessment and said since traffic flow is a criteria for establishing a speed limit, a change would be at least worth a look.

■ Regarding BNSF Railways plans to put a third rail line in the

city, Bunch said staff is trying to reroute a few sewer lines in the installation area. He said he's had conversations with BNSF, warning that if a third line is added at Mabry and Norris the portion of Norris between the tracks and Mabry for vehicles would shrink.

"A truck will not be able to sit in that area," Bunch said. "They'll be sitting in the roadway."

■ Clovis Municipal Schools Operations Director John King reviewed upcoming projects for CMS, and started by saying plans are to move into the new Highland Elementary in July for a fall opening.

King said the district planned to do plumbing and heating/air conditioning work at Barry Elementary, but the school moved up the state priority list and could now qualify for Public Schools Finance Authority dollars. If approved, King said, the school would be eligible for other needed work for about what CMS would pay for plumbing and heating/air work alone.

Work on parking lots for Cameo and Mesa elementaries should begin by the end of May, and requests for proposals are out for abatement and demolition of the old Parkview Elementary.

■ The next meeting is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. June 26 at City Hall.

We've been honoring our war heroes with these ceremonies for more than 150 years in America.

The first memorial day took place at Arlington National Cemetery on May 30, 1868.

They called it Decoration Day. Its intent was "for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country ... and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land."

Those were the words used by Gen. John A. Logan, who called for the remembrance soon after the Civil War.

In 1971, the federal government established Memorial Day as an official holiday, declaring it should be observed on the last Monday of May and honor those who died in service of their country.

The Saturday and Sunday before that, we usually celebrate the freedoms our veterans have made possible by gathering in parks and back yards and playing ball and filling up plastic water pools.

Those celebrations are great.

Just remember also to at least say a silent prayer of thanks sometime this weekend for those who made our freedom possible.

Better yet, come out Monday to your community's formal Memorial Day gathering for a more public display of your appreciation for those who made the ultimate sacrifice on our behalf.

## Sanders would kneecap education

Few things offend Bernie Sanders as much as people escaping from command-and-control government systems, even minority students whose parents are desperate to get their kids a decent education.

The socialist wants to turn George Wallace on his head and not block black children from attending traditional public schools, but block them from exiting those schools for something better.

The New York Times wrote a long, devastating report the other day on the then-Burlington, Vermont, mayor's love affair with the Sandinistas in the 1980s. So many decades later, his reflex is the same: If the Sandinistas wouldn't favor it, he's not inclined to like it much either. That goes for charter schools that, yes, are publicly funded, but still too flexible and unregulated for refined socialist tastes.

Last weekend, Sanders unveiled his education plan. He wants to end for-profit charter schools (about 15 per-

cent of all charters) and impose a moratorium on new public funding of charters, while taking steps to impose a one-size-fits-all regulatory regime on existing charters.

Sanders thus seeks to kneecap what has been an astonishingly successful experiment in urban education because it doesn't fit nicely within his ideological preconceptions.

That Sanders says he wants to do this to advance the principle that "every human being has the fundamental right to a good education" is hilariously perverse. The comrades will have a good chuckle over that one.

Charter schools aren't the product of a libertarian conspiracy. They fall short of the

vouchers favored by conservatives to allow parents to get access to private schools. Charters receive public money, but have more leeway to develop policies outside the regulatory and union straitjacket of traditional public schools.

Charters had bipartisan support before a Vermont socialist became one of the party's thought leaders. Bill Clinton won the first-ever lifetime achievement award from the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools. Promoting charters was a hallmark of Barack Obama's education agenda, and a signature of Cory Booker's mayoralty in Newark, New Jersey.

Not all charters are created equal. Some don't serve their students well, especially online charter schools, and the performance of suburban and rural charter schools hasn't been very impressive. It's the charter schools in urban areas with the worst traditional public schools that have excelled.

According to a well-regarded 2015 study by Stanford's Center for Research on Education Outcomes, students in urban charter schools got the equivalent of 40 additional days of math instruction and 28 additional days of reading annually. The numbers for African American students in poverty were even better. Charters in Newark and Boston have seen enormous academic gains.

It's amazing what schools can do when they impose discipline, have the highest expectations and focus with a laser intensity on instruction.

It is doubtful how much of his anti-charter agenda Sanders would be able to enact if elected, since much of the action is at the state and local level. That he's hostile to these schools should, regardless, redound to his shame.

## Plenty of potential for art, innovation in Quay

Where there's art, there's innovation, especially in rural communities.

So says Richard Florida, who is described by Wikipedia as an American urban studies theorist focusing on social and economic theory.

He teaches at the University of Toronto and has a consulting outfit called the Creative Class Group. The creative class — artists and innovators of all kinds — is something he writes about frequently.

In a recent article called "The Rise of the Rural Creative Class" for a publication called "CityLab," Florida demonstrates that

creativity and innovation are strong in rural areas, and in some areas stronger, than they are in urban areas.

For instance, patents for products, material goods, are more likely to come from companies in rural areas than urban, Florida says.

There is a strong link between the presence of artistic creativity and busi-

ness and industrial innovation in rural areas, as well as in urban areas, he says.

He may not be alone in thinking that way.

When New Mexico MainStreet starts working to revitalize a community's downtown, it will often focus on restoring an old theater — the Yam in Portales, the Shuler in Raton, the Luna in Clayton and currently, the Princess in Tucumcari. Theaters invite performances and exhibitions.

I wrote in a previous column that Quay County may have the critical mass of professional artists and arts and culture events to become a center for art tourism

It's got to be good, though.

When it is, Florida points out, "31 percent of visitors travel beyond a reasonable distance" to visit such attractions.

Florida says successful art-tourism rural communities are often near forests and national parks. Quay County has Route 66 and two recreational lakes close by. I would think those attractions would be the equivalent.

The success of Rockabilly on the Route and, we hope, the Rockin' Route 66 event in June, as well as the annual Iron Pour and New Mexico Music Showcase demonstrate Quay County's poten-

tial to attract art and performance visitors, as do the Rawhide Days and Fired Up events in Tucumcari, and the annual Cowboy Gathering in Nara Visa.

Doug Quarles, who has done more than anyone else to make Tucumcari a city of murals, is back in town. We have the art faculty at Mesalands Community College and a few others around the county who make at least part of their living in the arts.

The Gallery, etc., continues to display the work of professional artists and local talent.

That's a start. Innovators in other areas who come for the art could also be exposed to

Mesalands' wind energy center and Bob Hockaday's plans for a waste-to-energy facility north of town, if they come for the art.

Now, what if Tucumcari were to host the Coronado Park Racetrack and Casino?

What a venue that would be for art and innovation events, too.

Whether it starts with art or innovation, there may be a lot of potential to develop both in Quay County.

# Stanton Friedman's voice will be missed

Roswell, New Mexico, 1947. Mention of the place, the year — that's all it takes. Even those only casually interested in reported UFO phenomena know at least parts of the story that follows. Those for whom the mysteries surrounding UFOs hold more allure — they're able to recite chapter and verse. The alleged crash of a flying saucer. And, depending on which theories one prefers, the recovery of its deceased alien occupants, followed by a government effort aimed at sweeping the whole thing under the rug.

The name of a city, a year. Even an eventful year. In the case of most places, that's not much to go on, but not so with Roswell. That's owed largely to one person — nuclear physicist and famed UFO researcher Stanton Friedman, who

died May 13 at 84 — and a conversation that began with his investigation into the Roswell Incident.

That conversation, which is still going on today, changed Roswell forever.

Friedman was a believer in the existence of extraterrestrial life — but his search for evidence was the quest of a scientist, a researcher.

As countless lectures, interviews and personal interactions made clear, he had a knack for connecting with people.

Here in Roswell, the connections run deep, and have for years. Back in the late 1970s, a radio station general manager in Baton Rouge, Louisiana — during an interview — told Friedman what was at the time a relatively obscure story about an alleged UFO incident.

In the ensuing years, hundreds of interviews were conducted and countless documents, unearthed

through Freedom of Information Act requests, studied — and as the lore surrounding the incident grew, so, locally, did the commerce.

The lore: Some say that back in 1947, a weather balloon crashed in the desert northwest of Roswell. Others theorize it was more, a balloon carrying equipment to detect the Soviets' atomic-detonation tests, part of top-secret Project Mogul. Still others go a step further: It was an alien spacecraft. The military recovered not only the craft but the bodies of dead extraterrestrials — and our government has doggedly pursued a cover-up ever since.

The headline on page 1 of the July 8, 1947, Roswell Daily Record read: "RAAF Captures Flying Saucer On Ranch in Roswell Region" — the information attributed to the intelligence office of the 509th Bombardment Group at Roswell Army Air Field.

The commerce: It's all around

us. There's the annual UFO Festival, the International UFO Museum and Research Center, which draws visitors year-round — and little green men everywhere we look. Local government has even leaned into it — as well it should — incorporating a flying saucer motif as part of the city's new logo.

It began, in large part, with Friedman's work and the spotlight it shone on Roswell. Many deserts hold many secrets — and the sun-scorched patch of earth where all this began still holds plenty. Weather balloon, Project Mogul — UFO? Who knows? But it has long since been anything but obscure.

People the world over are familiar with Friedman's work, but his impact on Roswell has been unique. As Roswell Daily Record Publisher Barbara Beck wrote after hearing of his death, "We mourn the death of a man who

made Roswell famous ... He was not afraid to stand up and debunk UFO hoaxes. His belief in extraterrestrials was based on data about UFO events he found buried in U.S. government documents.

"He was a calm, matter-of-fact person who stood by what he believed. He helped make our town famous, but never sought to exploit it. ..."

The discussion about what happened in the desert near Roswell in 1947 will continue without Friedman, but a unique and important voice — in regard to the Roswell incident and the field of UFO research worldwide — has been lost. The voice will be missed, and as tributes since his passing have made clear, so will the man.

His golf claim to fame: Well, that happened Thursday morning. Harris told his playing partners it was his first hole-in-one in six-plus decades playing the game.

He left a Facebook post downplaying the event.

"Thanks," Harris wrote. "(A guy's) gotta get lucky every now and then."

# Seniors weigh in at forum

CLOVIS — About 50 seniors showed up to a forum Wednesday at the Friendship Senior Center, with a hearing slated to hear concerns and get ideas for the next few years of city services to older adults.

Speakers ranged from local to federal, with reminders of current services and upcoming events.

The hearing, scheduled for two hours at the Friendship Center, ended after about 90 minutes after crowd members had run through their questions.

The largest concern among those who spoke usually dealt with cuts to Medicare or Medicaid. Ben Salazar, a field representative for Sen. Tom Udall, D-N.M., said members of Congress weren't likely to discuss Medicare or Medicaid cuts with the 2020 elections coming up, and said any communications from senior citizens would be heard because the group is the most consistent voting bloc in the country.

Regarding Medicare and Medicaid, Salazar said it was a small part of the budget in comparison to expense like national defense.

About 50 area senior citizens attended a public hearing on various senior concerns Wednesday at Clovis' Friendship Senior Center.

"I believe in a strong defense," Salazar said, "but at some point if you have paid into Medicaid or Medicare it's not an entitlement. You've earned it."

A few raised concerns about the local centers. Billy Gonzales of Clovis asked why fundraising done by the Friendship Center years ago wasn't being used for items like trips to the Senior

Olympics in Albuquerque. Senior Services Director Barbara Riggan said when the Friendship Center became a city-owned building, it put conditions on that money. In order to avoid violations of the state antidonation clause, the money had to be expended on things for the center itself, and Riggan said the money was used to fulfill many visitor requests.

State representative Martin Zamora attended the hearing, and told the seniors in attendance he was always willing to listen to their concerns. He noted he wasn't allowed in the Friendship Center to campaign. Riggan noted that was because the building was city-owned, but he was welcome back any time he wanted now that he is an elected state representative.

In a point that was echoed throughout the meeting, Salazar reminded residents to be ready for the 2020 census — whether they want one of the temporary jobs the process will create or they're just asked to fill out the form. "For every person who

doesn't fill out the form and isn't counted," Salazar said, "the county and our area lose \$3,000."

Other speakers at the hearing included:

Curry County Health Council Coordinator Susan Alman, who reminded the crowd of a community health event scheduled for 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday at the county administrative complex.

"You'll be able to know everything from babies to hospice," Alman said of the event.

United Way of Eastern New Mexico Executive Director Erinn Burch, who reminded seniors of the United Way's 2-1-1 service line. The number goes to the United Way office, where staff will direct callers to whatever service they need.

Melinda Coslett, coordinator for the Curry County 50-Plus Olympics. She noted that 23 people, and three teams, have qualified for the 2019 National Senior Games set for June 14-25 in Albuquerque.

School board to consider budget

CLOVIS — The Clovis Municipal Schools Board of Education will consider the 2019-20 budget, among other items, during its meeting Tuesday evening.

The budget for the upcoming year is \$65.9 million, an increase of just over \$7 million from the 2018-19 budget. The biggest increases come in the form of state-mandated 6% salary increases (\$4.33 million), benefits (\$1.02 million), staff for the new IAcademy (\$778,497), educational retirement board costs (\$531,176) and additional social workers.

The state is covering all but \$178,000 of the total increases.

The board will also consider a pair of contracts for incoming Superintendent Rene Russ.

Russ' salary will be \$153,000 per year. Her contract also includes use of a school-owned vehicle and a cellular phone allowance of \$1,000 annually.

Russ will also have a contract as interim superintendent, effective during June. For any days she acts as superintendent that month should current Superintendent Jody Balch be unavailable, she would receive an additional \$235.39 per day in addition to the salary for her current position as deputy director of federal programs.

Fox tests positive for rabies

TEXICO — A pair of fox attacks have been reported in Texico, with at least one of the foxes in question testing positive for rabies.

"We had a fox attack a dog in Texico (Tuesday)," Texico Police Chief Doug Bowman said. "The owner put the fox down. We secured the fox, had it sent off to the state lab (through a local veterinarian's office) and it came back positive for rabies."

Bowman said after those initial reports came out in social media, another Texico family had contacted him and said a fox attacked their dog on Wednesday.

Last month, the New Mexico Department of Health confirmed Curry County was one of four counties where skunks with rabies have been identified this year. The release confirmed five rabid skunks in Curry, Quay, De Baca and Colfax counties, but did not indicate how many were in each county.

The DPH reminds residents and visitors to be aware of animals behaving strangely, whether they are wild animals or domestic creatures, and to keep

pet rabies vaccinations up to date. Some guidelines from the department include:

■ Avoiding feeding wild animals, or touching wild animals whether alive or dead.

■ If bitten by an animal, immediately wash the exposed site with soap and water for 10-15 minutes, report the bite to animal control and seek medical care.

■ To report a sick or dead wild animal, or any wild animal acting abnormally, contact the state game and fish department at 505-476-8000.

Flash storm leaves some damage

of it. We got some very heavy rain and some minor road flooding but nothing that is stopping traffic. ... I can say, my wife's vehicle got one pretty good ding on the hood (from marblesized hail), so I would venture to say some minor damage."

Clovis racetrack interests still upbeat

CLOVIS — After last month's deflating development in the drawn-out racino award selection process, proponents for a horse racetrack and gaming project in Clovis said they were feeling optimistic again after speaking with the new makeup of the New Mexico Racing Commission.

"We're tickled pink. We're glad, we're happy, we're still involved," said Tom Martin, a spokesperson for the Vision 2020 group advocating Clovis' racino candidacy since last year. "Obviously, we were disappointed that the last commission did not reach a decision, but we're excited about the new commission."

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham fired the old commission and appointed five new commissioners April 24. A session May 16 in Albuquerque was the first regular meet-

ing of the new commission. NMRC didn't give any signals about how it leaned regarding a sixth license during that meeting, but a key member of the group proposing the project for Tucumcari said the lack of direction Thursday provided no reason for any of the applicants to be discouraged.

"I think we'll know more later," Warren Frost told a reporter. "I think it's a matter of letting them get their feet wet and going from there. They seem to be very enthusiastic about being on the commission, and they're willing to put forth as much work as they need to get it right."

Frost said he soon would urge the commission to visit the towns where parties have applied for a sixth license, which also include Clovis and Lordsburg.

Martin told The News on Saturday that he wasn't thrilled at the idea of doing site visits again — entailing three applicant presentations in Clovis and one each in

Tucumcari and Lordsburg — but acknowledged it would be "prudent" for the new commissioners to do as much.

While Martin said he would be "hard-pressed" to single out which of the three proposals for Clovis was the best option, he explained they each have different strengths and maintained his position that Clovis was the best site among the contenders.

"I will admit that we were a little in limbo and didn't really know what was going on, and maybe the momentum dropped slightly, but now that we've got this new commission we're fired up," Martin said. "They seemed to be receptive when we went up there and spoke with them, although it was unofficial.... I think they'll come back with a good decision."

Complaint filed against police department

ALBUQUERQUE — A complaint filed this month in Albuquerque's U.S. District Court alleges "deprivation of civil rights" in an incident this year with officers of the Clovis Police Department.

A suit filed by Christine Lucero as "the aunt of and Next Friend to Dan Lucero" describes a Feb. 22 incident wherein officers responded to the Hotel Clovis apartments on reports from Dan Lucero's mother that he was suicidal.

Ensuing details in the complaint, filed May 15,

allege a "vicious dog attack" that ensued within seconds of officers entering Lucero's apartment, in spite of him not making "any verbal or physical threats to the officers."

CPD officer Brent Aguilar, one of the named defendants in the complaints, allegedly released the police service dog "Leo" and "allowed the dog to clamp down on Dan's leg for approximately 30 seconds." Lucero was hospitalized following the incident for nine days each in a Lubbock hospital and Clovis nursing home for treatment to the "large, open, gaping wound that ensued," records show.

The complaint, filed by Albuquerque attorneys Matthew Coyte and Alyssa Quijano, claims that "Aguilar has routinely used unreasonable or excessive force when interacting with members of the community in Clovis," and states that CPD Chief Ford "has emboldened Defendant Aguilar to continue his practice of excessive force." The complaint names other CPD officers present during the incident but singles out Aguilar's history with prior incidents.

Federal court records show three other pending civil suits naming Aguilar as a defendant.

City attorney Dave Richards referred questions on the case to Santa Fe attorney Mark Basham, who told The News on Friday that he had only been appointed to the case in the past few days and needed more time to review the matter before commenting.

City Manager Justin Howalt told The News he doesn't comment on pending litigation, "however we take all of our citizens' concerns very seriously and we want to do the best to protect and serve our community."

Clovis Police did not respond Friday to a message about the February incident.

That's all part of a long-ranging plan to shore up water resources against the documented decline of levels in the Ogallala Aquifer. The entire Ute Pipeline project is over half a century in the making and still many

more years and millions of dollars before it's all done. Until then IGWP allows ENMWUA "to utilize the pipeline in the interim," according to a past news release.

That's a lot of moving pieces, and much to take in at once. It's simpler to look at construction on the ground — or in the ground, as it were.

"It's not just digging a

hole and throwing that pipe in there," said project manager Jim Honea.

In fact work on site has been in progress since November, when ENMWUA gave a notice to proceed to Oscar Renda Contracting. The past several months have consisted of permitting, clearing and grubbing, clearing the land for the dig and making sure it doesn't interfere with wildlife there. Only in the past week has the heavy machinery arrived for digging the trenches and placing the pipe at a minimum depth of four feet.

At 33 inches in diameter, the pipes are just large enough for a person to crawl inside and remove the supportive stulls inside. Those wooden stulls are no longer needed after the sections are

welded together and encased in a surrounding layer of "controlled low strength material," made from native soil.

The pipeline installation moves at a pace of roughly eight 50-foot sections per day, with topsoil and vegetation replaced and replanted in tandem with the construction's progress.

"They're doing it right, so this pipeline will last forever and ever," ENMUA Administrator Orlando Ortega told The News.

Forever is another difficult concept — Ortega clarified, emphasizing the "expertise of engineering and precision in the installation of the system, quality control and assurance," meaning a long pipeline life of "75 years to well over a century."

**Portales budget concerns raised**

PORTALES — Looking at some “alarming” dips into reserves for the upcoming interim budget, Portales city manager asked the city council to be prepared to look at ways to “cut services or increase revenue streams” in order to keep the books balanced in the coming fiscal year.

“We’re really getting into our reserves,” Sammy Standerfer told councilors in a presentation on the fiscal year 2019-2020 preliminary interim budget during the regular meeting Tuesday night. “And that will spark some other conversations.”

Standerfer compared the interim budgets for 2018-19 and 2019-20, noting each had beginning cash balances of \$3,000,000. Projected revenues of \$7,531,709 in the latest interim budget were 2.56% higher than in the previous year, but there were also “decreases in budgeted revenues for ambulance fees, recreation & pool

fees” and miscellaneous revenues. Ambulance fees are projected to decrease because a transport company has recently started handling all “non-emergency transports,” Standerfer said.

The general fund is “projected to draw down reserves by \$1,300,389 in FY 19-20,” said Standerfer’s presentation. Consequently, he explained, city leadership should look toward either a reduction in services or in increase in their fees. Other ways to increase revenue could include incremental increases in either property taxes, municipal Gross Receipts Tax or the Hold Harmless Gross Receipts Tax, the latter of which Standerfer recommended against.

Also at Tuesday’s city council meeting:

- Recognition of the Portales High School Chamber Choir for its 2019 New Mexico Activities Association state championship.
- Approval of a joint resolution between Roosevelt County and the city “to

increase community awareness and participation” in the 2020 census, with documents noting that “communities lose approximately \$3,000 federal dollars per year for each resident failing to participate in the Census.” Census Day is April 1, 2020, and the resolution specified that the city and county “shall each appoint three members” to the local census committee, “established to serve in an educational and promotional advisory capacity.”

■ Approval of resolution authorizing city to apply for participation in the Juvenile Adjudication Program. The state legislature created a fund in 2009 “to support an alternative adjudication process for juveniles charged with traffic and other misdemeanor offenses,” according to the meeting documents. If awarded, funds from the program would assist the city in bringing Teen Court volunteer attorneys and adult chaperons to Santa Fe for court and legislative sessions and possibly a Round House tour.



## Relay team finishes fifth at nationals

Same relay team placed eighth in 2018 Division II nationals.

KINGSVILLE, Texas — Though Friday and Saturday was time for most people to leave work behind, hit the highways and think about having fun, some Eastern New Mexico track athletes were hard at work.

Eastern New Mexico's 400-meter women's team was among the con-

tingent representing the Greyhounds at the NCAA Division II Outdoor Track & Field Championships in Kingsville, Texas, Thursday through Saturday. And that team — consisting of Kandice Miles, Maijah Mathis, Danee Bustos and Lateria Slaughter — placed fifth in Saturday's final, posting a time of 46.68 and earning four points for the Greyhound cause. Though the 400 relay team gave its own school record a chase, the

quartet ultimately fell short of the 45.56 mark. Lincoln (Mo.) took first in the event, picking up 10 points with its 45.33 time. Finishing second through fourth, respectively, were San Francisco State (45.59, 8 points), Pittsburg State (45.95, 6 points) and West Texas A&M (45.96, 5 points). Grand Valley State (46.94, 3 points) and Southern Wesleyan (47.99, 2 points) came

Eastern. St. Augustine's didn't finish. Miles and Mathis also competed in women's sprint events, and Greyhound middle-distance runner Ivar Moinat took part in the men's 800. Miles had a good women's 200-meter prelim run, coming away with ninth place. Ivar Moinat recorded a 12th-place finish in the men's 800-meter prelims. Miles just missed making the

championship cut, finishing a mere 0.01 seconds back of the eighth-place spot with a time of 24.38. Mathis also competed in the 200-meter prelim, finishing 21st with a time of 25.16. In the men's 800 prelims, Moinat crossed the finish line in 1:54.50 to place in the top 12 for a second straight championship meet after placing seventh in the 800 at this year's NCAA Division II Indoor National Championships.

## Cats on the right track

Clovis athletes find way into school's record books.

Clovis' track and field season is over. But the results of it will go on and on and on.

The Wildcats' track and field season officially ended May 18 at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque when the Clovis boys finished second in the state 5A championship meet behind Cleveland, and the Lady Wildcats took fourth. But there were some marks this year, championship-winning or close, that elevated some current Wildcats into the school's top 10 all-time.

"I guess you never know how you do at a meet until you start looking at it from a historical perspective," Clovis boys coach Mark Sena said. "It still hurts that you didn't win a championship, but when you see your boys give that kind of performance, it makes you feel better."

Sophomore Jerrick Maldonado set a new record in the 800 (1:55.27) in the Wildcat Relays on Apr. 18 at Leon Williams Stadium. "And that kid's only a sophomore," Sena said, "so I imagine we'll have to keep that plaque off the wall for a while." Maldonado first made the 800-meter top 10 last year with his time of 1:59.05, good for seventh place on Clovis High's all-time list. He shaved almost four seconds off that last month with his record-setting number.

Jon Fuentes had already made the top five in the 800 last year (1:57.97), which was then fourth, now fifth. He added another top 10 mark this season, posting the sixth all-time number (1:58.46). T.J. Gregg cracked the 800-meter top 10 this year, posting the school's ninth-best time (1:59.83).

In the 1,600-meter run, Jon Fuentes established the school's third-best time this year (4:25.82), while his 4:25.27 time from last year still ranks at No. 2. T.J. Gregg posted Clovis' fourth-best time this season (4:26.17). Izzy Miranda owns the top spot with his 4:21.83 time from 2009.

In the 3,200-meter run, Fuentes became No. 2 all-time this year (9:35.66), while Maldonado and Gregg each landed in the top five. Maldonado is

now fourth (9:47.92), Gregg seventh (9:58.06). Fuentes also has the fifth spot from last year (9:54.15) and the eighth spot from 2017 (9:58.1). Miranda is still Clovis' 3,200 king, with his 9:27.8 time from 2009.

The 1,600 medley relay team of Jeston Webskowski, Ernesto Acuna, Brandon Mason and Maldonado ended the season with the No. 2 all-time mark, 3:33.55, which won that quartet a state championship last weekend. They ended the season still chasing the top number (3:31.4), established in 1964.

"We'll give that one another shot," Sena said. "We still have Maldonado a little longer."

In fact, the whole medley relay team is due back next season. Webskowski, Acuna and Maldonado will only be juniors, Brandon Mason a senior.

The 4x200 relay team of Brandon Mason, Acuna, Malik Phillips and Montez Wright posted the school's eighth-best all-time mark of 1:29.52, good enough for third at last weekend's state meet. Last year's team of Phillips, Wright, Seth Lopez and Austin Fuentes sits at No. 1 (1:26.84).

Kris Byrd and Richard Masterson each put up top-10 marks in the 110 hurdles this year; Byrd landed in seventh (15.23), Masterson in eighth (15.26). Former NFL player Hank Baskett, a 2001 Clovis High graduate, still reigns at No. 1 after 18 years with his time of 13.93.

Byrd made fifth on the high jump list this season (6-2), tying for that spot with Lincoln Nora (2010) and Traivon Sopila (2012). Baskett still owns that mark, too, with his 7-foot jump in 2001.

Wright, the top points earner at last weekend's state 5A meet, set plenty of top-10 Clovis marks this year, among them getting second all-time in the 200-meter dash (21.6), which won him a state title last weekend and placed him on the Clovis High list behind only Tanner Fickling's 21.22 mark set in 2006.

Wright's 10.69 time in last weekend's 100-meter dash earned him a state championship and put him eighth on Clovis' all-time list. Phillip Williams' 10.36 time from 2005 is still No. 1.

Wright also notched the school's seventh-best time in the 400 (50.10). Wright's former teammate Austin Fuentes broke the school's 400 record last year with his time of 49.36.

Wright this year also grabbed the fifth spot in the long jump (23-0.75) and seventh in the triple jump (45-6.5). Dorond Jackson still owns both the

long (24-1 inch) and triple jump (49 feet) marks, both set in 2003.

Pacer Hill reached third all-time in the pole vault this year (14-2). A recent Wildcat, Burgin Foster, holds the top two spots — 16 feet from last year and 15-3 from 2017.

Jaylen Mason and Bryce Cabeldue were each top 10 in the javelin this past season — Mason was ninth (166-3), Cabeldue 10th (165 feet). Alfonso Rivas' 2014 mark of 183-8, still stands at No. 1 five years later.

A Clovis athlete who didn't quite make the school's top 10 but excelled nonetheless was Stephen Acosta, who rang up a new personal best in the shot put, and placed third at states (49-0.5). "That was at a time when we were really needing points," Sena said.

Also not to be overlooked was Brandon Mason, who didn't set a school triple jump record this year, but showed heart in Albuquerque. Mason is already ninth on the school's all-time list with last year's distance of 44-2.75, but early in the morning on the last day of this year's state championship meet, Mason was injured in the third triple jump preliminaries, coming down wrong which caused his hip to buckle.

"He was on the ground for several minutes and had to be checked out by the athletic trainers," Sena said. "Just a few hours later he was on the track running again, because he didn't want to let anybody down. It was a supreme show of guts by that kid. He wanted to give it a shot, so we let him. That was just an example of the kids having a lot of fight."

All in all, it was a memorable season for the Wildcats.

"When you have that number of kids putting up all-time numbers, that's pretty special," Sena said.

Which makes it not-too-surprising that the Wildcats brought a red trophy home from Albuquerque.

"Everyone told me how proud they are of me," Sena said, "But it wasn't me, it was those kids. ... Not enough good things can be said about our track team this year. We've had a lot of fast kids here at Clovis. Special group of kids. It was a joy to work with them."

## Coach spots open

Yet, some of the resignations were expected and the replacements seem natural fits.

Nathan Dodge had to step down as Portales' boys soccer coach last year because of his busy assistant principal duties, and his successor Juan Mendez left after just one season. Enter Michael Aunan, the Rams head cross country coach.

"We knew we were going to have to hire a new boys soccer coach," Portales High Athletic Director Mark Gallegos said, "and Michael Aunan wanted to move from cross country to soccer, so that move was pretty simple. Aunan's hiring as the new boys soccer coach means he'll have to step away from cross country. In comes Laura McNeil.

# Gomez leaving ENMU baseball after six seasons

PORTALES — Eastern New Mexico University will soon begin a nationwide search for a new baseball coach, as David Gomez has resigned the spot to pursue other opportunities in his home state of Louisiana.

The university announced the resignation Wednesday.

“I would like to thank Dr. (Steven) Gamble and Dr. (Jeff) Geiser (former president and athletic director) for first giving me a chance to become an NCAA head coach, and I would also like to then thank Dr. (Jeff) Elwell and Dr. (Greg) Waggoner (current president and AD) for providing

me the means to make history here with the program,” Gomez said in a release. “I will always remember the kids that made an impact here and our history that we made while increasing the roster numbers from the state of New Mexico and our academic achievements.”

Gomez coached the Greyhounds for six seasons, going 123-169 with a 49-

123 record in Lone Star Conference play — including a 32-18 campaign in 2017.

The 2018 season saw the Greyhounds go 24-24 and win their first LSC postseason game in school history. This last season saw the Green and Silver struggle to a 15-33 mark, but the team did lead the LSC in batting average (.322) and finished fourth in all of Division II

with 153 stolen bases.

Over his six years, Gomez coached 34 All-LSC selections, six all-region selections, two All-Americans and two MLB draft picks (Clyde Kendrick and Cody Pope, both in 2015).

**Women’s hoops adds Hurst** — The Eastern New Mexico University women’s basketball program made it a half-dozen new additions, with junior college transfer Anasha Hurst joining the fold for 2019-20.

The signing of Hurst, a 5-foot-8 guard from Kirkwood Community College, was announced Wednesday in a university release.

“Coach (Kim) Muhl at

Kirkwood Community College does an outstanding job with his program and it is an honor to be able to get Anasha,” ENMU coach Josh Prock said. “She is a very versatile player who can play multiple positions. Anasha is a playmaker and is someone who understands how to make everyone on her team better.”

As a sophomore, Hurst started all but one game for the Eagles, who went 27-7 overall and 15-1 in the Iowa Community College Athletic Conference. She was second on the team with 8.7 points per game, and also averaged 3.8 rebounds and 2.0 steals per game. She was part of an Eagle defense that held opponents to 52.9 points per game and 30.9 percent

shooting. She had four games of at least five steals.

“One of the best attributes we love about Anasha is her ability to defend,” coach Prock said. “We believe Anasha is an elite defender and will be someone who will cause nightmares for our opponents. Another tremendous attribute of this young lady is her ability to attack the basket, being left handed gives her a unique ability to make plays.”

The Greyhounds signed Arizona high school guard Taylor Hall in the fall semester, and in the spring have added Portales High’s Taylee Rippee, Western Oregon transfer Natalie DeLonge, South Carolina state transfer Jasmine Williams and Rio Rancho’s Julia Chavez.

and has been an assistant in Portales programs for nearly a decade.

“So Amanda just moved over, made it easy,” Gallegos said. “From the beginning of the year we wanted to transition Amanda to that head job. It’s gone well, it’s been an easy transition.”

Hunton’s resignation was not terribly surprising for Gallegos, either.

“Matt’s a contract coach for us,” Gallegos said. “He has a business; Matt has a lot on his plate. He’s been really good to us the last five years, but he has a lot of outside interests. So he just felt time-wise it was time to get out.”

But not all the Portales coaching changes were expected.

“The one that came as a surprise was Dusty Nusser,” Gallegos acknowledged. “Dusty’s going to stay an assistant football coach, but he decided it was time for a change and he’s going to do something different in the

spring.”

That’s it for the head coaching changes, but Gallegos says there will be more hiring beyond those jobs.

### Clovis changes

Unlike Portales, Clovis High won’t have as much varsity head coaching turnover, which is great news for athletic director Lonnie Baca.

“Compared to last year when I came in, we’re in good shape as far as coaches,” Baca said.

Baca and Clovis High are fairly lucky that there is just

one varsity head coaching position to be filled for next school year. According to Baca, girls varsity head coach Steve Speck turned in his resignation Friday morning.

“Everybody else has indicated that they’re returning for next season,” Baca said. “We did hire a new (varsity) head cheerleading coach, Becky Jones. Becky was our Freshman Academy cheerleading coach and she’ll be moving up. And other than that, all our (varsity) head coaches are back for next season.”

Clovis coaching positions that remained open as of Memorial Day weekend were: two for freshman football; one for freshman boys track; one for freshman drill team; one for freshman cheerleading; one for girls junior varsity basketball; and

one assistant baseball coaching job.

“People move around at the assistant level,” Baca said. “Maybe some of them are moving into head coaching jobs and looking to do other things.”

Baca says that interviews will be conducted this coming week, so some of the above vacancies could be filled soon.

Several Clovis High coaching jobs that came open have already been filled.

Logan Turnbow, head coach of Elida’s boys varsity basketball team, will become the Wildcats’ boys junior varsity coach and serve as an assistant football coach. As for the latter, Baca said, “we haven’t determined whether he’ll coach at the sophomore or JV level.”

Amanda Boydston has been hired as junior varsity cheerleading coach; Joseph Drozenja from North Carolina will be an assistant varsity football coach; Levi Lynch has been hired as a girls soccer assistant; and Francisco Trujillo will be a boys soccer assistant.

## Chorizo, chicken and seafood paella

3 tablespoons olive oil  
1 chicken, cut into 6-8 pieces  
8 oz. pork loin, cut into 6-8 pieces

1 lb. Chorizo, sliced in 1/4 inch pieces  
8 large shrimp, in the shell  
2 red bell peppers, diced  
2 medium onions, finely chopped  
4 garlic cloves, finely chopped  
4 Roma tomatoes, diced  
1/4 cup Spanish sherry  
1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika  
Pinch of saffron  
3 cups short grain Bomba or Calasparra rice  
8 cups chicken stock  
2 tablespoons parsley, finely chopped  
Salt to taste  
1/4 cup fresh or frozen peas  
1 lb. black mussels, scrubbed and rinsed  
Heat oil in a large (16"-18") paella pan set over

medium heat. Sauté chicken pieces in oil until golden brown, remove from pan and set aside. Add the pork and chorizo and sauté in the same oil until crisp. Remove them and set aside. Sauté the shrimp for 3 minutes in the same oil, adding more if necessary, remove them from pan. Make the Sofrito: sauté onions in the same oil until onions soften slightly, and then add peppers and tomatoes, mix well. Allow mixture to simmer over low heat for 10 minutes. Make a well in the center of the pan and add Spanish sherry, smoked paprika and saffron. Add rice and stir to combine. Add 1 cup stock, bring to a boil then reduce heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Return the chicken, pork and sausages to the pan and

then remainder of stock. Increase heat to medium-high and cook, without stirring, until rice starts to swell, about 15 minutes. Stir in parsley and check rice for salt and adjust. Nestle mussels into the rice and reduce heat to low. Continue cooking until the rice is done and the liquid has evaporated, about 15 minutes more. Gently stir in peas and nestle shrimp into rice. When paella is finished, let stand 5 minutes off the heat before serving. Serves 8-10.

# Students work to build alternative energy systems

ROSWELL — Eight local high school students have spent the semester creating renewable energy devices.

The University High School seniors and juniors have been enrolled in the Clean Energy Systems course taught by science faculty member Andrea Batista, who attended a summer 2018 program to prepare for leading the class.

In recent weeks, the students have presented some of the results of their work on solar and wind energy and DC motor projects to the public, including at a presentation to education and business leaders held at Eastern New Mexico University-Roswell, on a local radio show and at a May 5 Sunday Fun-day event at the Historical Society for Southeast New Mexico.

"One of (Superintendent Ann McIlroy's) visions for RISD (Roswell Independent School District) is that we want kids to run to school," said RISD Director of Federal Programs Jennifer Cole during the Historical Society talk.

"These kids actually showed up to school at 1 o'clock this afternoon to prep for this presentation, so they are running to school," she said. "It is all about hands-on experiences and getting them to careers and to college and success beyond high school."

Cole helped to obtain funding for the course, which requires a lot of materials. She said the money came from Title 1 and grant funds. She also added that the class is the

first clean energy lab, although the local school district has other project-based science, technology, engineering and mathematics courses, including SystemsGo, a rocket-building course.

The three students at the Historical Society presentation were Jaiden Van Doorn, Jonathan Gallegos and Anthony Jones.

Part of the students' presentation included an overview of southeast New Mexico energy, which is heavily dependent on oil and natural gas, a part of the state economy since 1927. A student explained that all energy sources have advantages and disadvantages.

"Of course we don't need to completely take oil out of the economy," said Gallegos, "but it is a good idea to introduce other energy sources to

make the world a better place and hopefully more inhabitable for future generations."

They also showed the prototypes of devices they had built and tested, including small wind turbines, small solar panels designed for use in third-world countries and capable of powering a cellphone, and a direct current (DC) motor. In addition to the design, build and experimental work, the students also took written tests on the fundamental facts and principles behind the work.

Having finished these three projects early, some members of the class intend to spend the last few weeks of the academic year doing research on biofuels, said Jones.

The students said they were exposed to the possibility of new academic or

career fields, gained good experience, practiced their presentation skills and learned about the importance of teamwork.

"I really like this class because in other classes we get lectured and are not really able to get hands-on," said Van Doorn.

Batista said that her goal is to enlarge and expand the reach of the course by teaching it again in future years and eventually offering the second course in the curriculum. Students taking both courses would be prepared to test for certification in the photovoltaic solar field, she said.

Other students in the University High class are Ulises Soto, Kevin Avery, Greg Archuleta, Angel Borunda and Luke Lara.





**American Duchess** by Karen Harper travels back to 1895, St Thomas Episcopal Church on New York City's Fifth Avenue, where heiress Consuelo Vanderbilt, just 18, has been bullied by her mother into marriage to the aloof Duke of Marlborough. 





## 2020 Dems promise more gun control

❑ Experts say those promises will be hard to keep.

WASHINGTON — California Sen. Kamala Harris and other Democrats running for president have promised aggressive action to stem the nation's epidemic of gun violence if they win the White House in 2020.

But when it comes to restricting gun access, experts say executive action is unlikely to make a significant dent in the problem, and any steps the president takes unilaterally are likely to be embroiled in legal challenges.

The reality is it's Congress — not the president — that holds most of the power on gun policy.

The executive branch has "limited discretion" on guns, University of California, Los Angeles Law Professor Adam Winkler told McClatchy.

Former Democratic President Barack Obama "looked at all these things and had a list of 20 executive actions. Even with 20 executive actions, it didn't add up to much," said Winkler, an expert in constitutional law. "The real take-away of these campaign promises is how gun control has surged ... as a way to energize Democratic voters."

While Democrats even a decade ago mostly avoided talking about guns, fearing it could alienate swing voters, the party's 2020 presidential candidates are making a different calculation. Most in the primary field have unveiled proposals to tighten restrictions on

guns or made promises to do so on the campaign trail.

The latest: former Texas Rep. Beto O'Rourke, who penned an op-ed in the Houston Chronicle laying out his four-point plan to stop gun violence.

The candidates tend to downplay how much they would rely on Congress to achieve their goals.

For example, much of New Jersey Sen. Cory Booker's expansive 2020 gun agenda — including the centerpiece, a universal federal gun licensing system — would require Congress to pass new legislation. South Bend, Indiana, Mayor Pete Buttigieg also recently endorsed the idea.

Banning the sale of so-called assault weapons also would require a new law. Harris, Booker, O'Rourke and Buttigieg have all promised to pursue that goal, as have many other 2020 candidates.

Betting that Republicans in Congress will block any gun action, Harris' campaign has zeroed in on gray areas in existing gun laws that her advisers believe permit the president to tighten restrictions.

"If Congress is not going to act, and we have no indication that they will, we're going to use absolutely everything in our authority to do as much as we can to fight back," said Harris campaign spokeswoman Kirsten Allen.

### Banning AR-15 imports

Over the past month, the California senator has announced

five different actions on guns she would take in 2021 if Congress fails to act within the first 100 days of her presidency.

Most recently, Harris pledged to prohibit the importation of AR-15-style assault weapons. The Gun Control Act of 1968 gives the executive branch broad authority to bar gun imports that are "not suitable for or readily adaptable to sporting purposes," experts agree.

Different administrations have had very different interpretations of what falls under that category, said David Kopel, a policy analyst with the Cato Institute, a center-right think tank in Washington, D.C.

But legal experts said Harris would have a difficult time following through on another pledge — to take gun manufacturers and dealers to court for negligence, among other violations.

The Harris campaign notes that while a 2005 liability law, the Protection of Commerce in Arms Act, protects gun sellers from a broad array of individual lawsuits, those protections don't apply when the plaintiff is the federal government. Harris promised her administration would enforce not just federal laws, but state and local guns laws, as well.

UCLA's Winkler said there are some exceptions to the 2005 law, which the administration could use to go after some gun makers and sellers who make defective products or violate other existing laws. But overall, "The protections are pretty extensive."

"Very few efforts to hold gun

manufacturers liable ... have been successful," he said.

### Background checks

As president, Harris would also run into problems enforcing another near-universal background check requirement she promised last month. The first-term senator has proposed categorizing anyone who sells five or more guns per year as a "gun dealer" for federal licensing purposes, thus triggering a background check on all their gun sales.

"I don't see how she can possibly do that," said Kopel of the Cato Institute. Key language in the Gun Control Act of 1968 defines a gun dealer as someone engaged in repetitive transactions for the purpose of profit. A collector could sell more than five guns in a year but argue that it's not for the purpose of profit, he pointed out.

Harris would "certainly run into a legal challenge" said Kopel. "And if the court was fair, you'd have to rule against her."

Lindsay Nichols, federal policy director for Giffords Law Center, supports more stringent federal gun policies. But Nichols doubted the federal government could meaningfully alter the existing background checks system without new legislation.

"We've seen this over and over again, criminals will take advantage of any loophole that

exists in the law," she said.

Despite the limits on presidential power, however, Nichols said having a president who is focused on tightening gun laws would represent a notable shift. "Just treating gun violence, gun safety as a priority that requires action at the highest level, that is something, certainly, the current administration is not doing," Nichols said.

She pointed out that a Democratic administration could take some steps without Congress' approval, like shift resources toward programs for gun violence prevention and for those affected by gun violence — things that Booker detailed in his gun agenda.

The president could also beef up the Department of Justice's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) and encourage it to better coordinate with other federal agencies as well as state and local governments. "The ATF has been doing a lot of the A and the T but not much of the F," Harris joked at a CNN town hall in April. "We need to fix that."

Just enforcing existing laws "requires coordination across different members of the Cabinet, different agencies, different departments and also coordination between federal and state and local governments," Nichols said. "Those are things that are not happening right now."
