Clovis Dillard's location planning to close

□ Spokeswoman says she doesn't have date for when store shutters.

CLOVIS — After two decades of dressing eastern New Mexico, Dillard's department store is planning to close its North Plains Mall location.

Dillard's has been the southside anchor for the mall since 2000. It moved into its current location soon after Walmart left the mall spot in 1999.

Clovis' store manager Christopher Addison confirmed the store's closing, but said additional information would have to come from corporate offices.

About two dozen shoppers were gathered outside the store 10 minutes before it opened Tuesday morning. Signs on the windows stated new store hours but gave no indication when it might close for good.

Corporate spokeswoman Julie Johnson Guymon also confirmed the closing and said all of the store's 50 employees had been notified.

"While it is a difficult decision, we do strategically close locations from time to time," Guymon wrote in an email. "For instance, last year we closed 6 locations."

Guymon said she did not have a date for when the Clovis Dillard's will close.

A Dillard's press release issued Thursday showed the company reported a net loss of \$162 million for the 13 weeks ended May 2. That compared to a net income of \$78.6 million for the first quarter of 2019.

"COVID-19 has impacted every aspect of our business," Dillard's Chief Executive Officer William T. Dillard II stated in the release. "The mall business in general and department stores, specifically, have been particularly hard hit."

Dillard's temporarily closed all 285 of its stores across the country at some point during the pandemic. The Clovis location had been closed since mid-March, as ordered by New Mexico Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, until reopening Tuesday.

Weekend sees spike in COVID-19

□ Increased testing may explain positive cases in Clovis, Portales.

The weekend was a dark one for eastern New Mexico in its battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.

On Saturday, the region set a one-day record for new cases and two local nursing homes reported confirmed cases.

But officials said there is little reason to suspect eastern New Mexico is becoming a hot spot for the virus.

"No ... the data isn't supporting that," Roosevelt County Manager Amber Hamilton said. "Our community is doing a great job of combating this."

Roosevelt County had 12 new cases reported Saturday, increasing its total from 14 to 26. A 27th case was reported Monday. Curry County had four new cases reported Saturday — and one more on Sunday, increasing its total to 41 — double the number it had May 5.

Also Saturday, Retirement Ranch in Clovis and Heartland Continuing Care Center in Portales joined the growing list of New Mexico senior centers reporting cases of coronavirus.

All four individuals who tested positive were asymptomatic, officials said, but both facilities began new rounds of tests for residents and staff as precautions.

Roosevelt General Hospital Administrator Kaye Green reported on the RGH Facebook page that nine of the most recent Roosevelt County cases came through the hospital, but none are currently hospitalized. Green said she believes seven of the new cases were tested because individuals believed they had been exposed by one other person who had tested positive.

"This person may have spread the virus to family members, co-workers and community members before self-quarantine began," RGH public relations director Jeanette Orrantia wrote in an email on Tuesday.

"This is why it's very important to self isolate if you have been exposed or considered positive for the virus."

Officials said they do not know the source of all the new cases, but they may not be cause for concern.

"I would like to think the numbers are a result of the significant increase in

COVID-19 detected at Heartland CCC

□ Resident retests negative and is 'doing great' with no symptoms.

PORTALES — When the Heartland Continuing Care Center resident first learned on Friday that she'd tested positive for COVID-19, she was none too happy about it.

"She gave us an earful," Heartland CEO Ranelle Tweedy said of the 96-year-old woman's reaction to the news.

"She said nobody was going to tell her she had this silly virus."

Tweedy said the resident, whom she would not identify

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because of privacy laws, had not felt sick before or after she was most recently tested on May 12.

The positive result — the first involving a local senior center resident since the pandemic began — came from a routine molecular swab test that all of the Center's 52 residents have received, Tweedy said.

The woman was tested again on Saturday with a rapid diagnostic test and that test was negative for COVID-19.

Tweedy said she is waiting on the Department of Health to recommend the best time for the resident to take the molecular swab test again, which the Food and Drug Administration has suggested should be used to validate the rapid test.

"She is doing great, doesn't have any issues," Tweedy said. "She's pretty disgusted that she's tested positive since she's had absolutely no symptoms."

Tweedy said all of the Center's residents and its 39 staff have

been tested for the coronavirus since May 12 and all but the one has been negative as of Tuesday morning.

She said the Center's routine the past few months has been to test 15 percent per week. Staff is also regularly tested, plus employees are screened prior to each shift.

In addition, she said residents are assessed twice daily with nurses checking vital signs, taking temperatures and conducting lung assessments. A doctor is notified if any resident exhibits signs of illness.

While residents are mostly iso-

One injured in Sunday house fire

CLOVIS — The Clovis Fire Department battled a house fire Sunday evening, with the department reporting one person suffering minor burns.

Lt. Chris Elam of the CFD reported the call came in about 5:30 p.m. The blaze at 1604 Axtell, a single-story residence, was knocked down within half an hour.

The response to the fire, which involved two rooms and some hallway space, was responded to with three fire engines, an ambulance and a battalion commander unit along with various Clovis Police Department units for traffic control.

Elam noted a motorist ran over one of the hoses, and the visual damage suggests the equipment will be put out of service.

Clovis Police Capt. Roman Romero reported that during the course of the investigation, a 24-year-old woman was taken into custody for possession of a controlled substance. It wasn't immediately clear if or how she was connected to the fire.

The CPD is investigating the cause of the fire, Elam said.

Xcel resumes in-person reading

Xcel Energy resumed in-person meter reading in New Mexico on Monday following more than a month of meter estimates, according to a company release.

In-person readings were put on hold April 14 due to con-

cerns about the COVID-19 pandemic.

The release notes employees will be wearing protective masks in the field, and asks residents to not approach employees in the field.

The company has announced it will not disconnect residential customers for nonpayment until further notice, and has installed employee safety measures that include enhanced cleaning protocols and occupant limits in company vehicles.

For the last few weeks, the company billed customers by using prior years to estimate usage. Any overcharging or undercharging that occurred as a result will be accounted for in upcoming bills.

Jaden Phillips commits to UNM

CLOVIS — Jaden Phillips is a New Mexico native. And his residence status isn't expected to change until at least mid-decade.

Late last week, the Clovis High defensive end/wide receiver announced that he had committed to playing for the University of New Mexico. Climbing the football ladder up to Division I will involve a 3 1/2-hour car ride to Albuquerque.

Phillips, who will be a Clovis High senior in August, was recruited by UNM as a defensive athlete, and will play either defensive line or linebacker for the Lobos.

"I'm really excited that I'll get to represent for my state and my hometown," said Phillips, a lifelong Clovis resident. "And I'm going to a real good college."

"He realizes the importance of him going there," Clovis head football coach Cal Fullerton said. "Now our kids are going to look up to him. He can kind of lead the way now and show these younger kids that stuff's possible when you do what you need to. ... The sky's the limit."

Phillips, 6-foot-2, 245 pounds, was recruited by a football program in flux, with head coach Bob Davie and UNM agreeing to part ways last November after eight seasons. Davie, who had previously coached Notre Dame for five seasons, was replaced at UNM by Danny Gonzales, a man who knows defense. Gonzales' most recent coaching position was as Arizona State's defensive coordinator under head coach Herm Edwards, a former NFL defensive back and coach.

Gonzales will be entrenched as Lobos head coach by the time Phillips arrives in Albuquerque to play for him next year. Where Phillips will play for Gonzales may not be decided until then, according to Fullerton.

"They're not sure," Fullerton said.

"They talked about maybe inside linebacker, and they talked about a down lineman. They do want him for defense because they like the way he's built. They want him with his hand on the ground (playing defensive line). But they see how athletic he is, so they might play him at linebacker."

Wherever Phillips is asked to line up, he will fill the role gladly.

"As long as I'm out there making an impact, helping the team," he said.

For Phillips, going Division I is part of a football adventure that began in the second grade. It took about five years, though, for him to begin seeing his own potential.

"It started in middle school when I realized that I actually could do something with the sport," Phillips said.

"My love for the game developed as I realized that I could play this sport and do great things as I got older and started growing stronger and my desire to

get better and play the game was a whole lot stronger."

Nature helped out, as Phillips grew into the shape of a Division I college player, as his height and weight started to fall in line with his desire to play at a higher level. His athleticism didn't hurt, either.

"Him being a three-sport athlete, coaches at the next level, they love that," Fullerton said. "They like to see kids competing year round."

UNM saw Phillips follow football season with basketball season, basketball season with track season. And the Lobos counted themselves lucky that the defensive standout and overall athlete was still available.

"They were really surprised that more teams weren't on him," Fullerton said. "Just what they saw he puts on film, the kind of kid he is, his grades are good. They're pretty much getting the all-around package with Jaden."

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Might be more commits to come for Clovis

Recruitment is an exciting time for high school athletes.

No exception locally, as Clovis High's Chance Harris and Jaden Phillips committed to play Division I football during the past week.

Harris will play quarterback for Colorado State; Phillips will be a defensive lineman or linebacker for the University of New Mexico.

In the strange days of COVID-19, the commitments of Harris and Phillips seem like a break in the

gloom, even more exciting than usual under the circumstances.

"Oh, extremely, extremely, man. It's a huge deal," Clovis head football coach Cal Fullerton said Monday night. "Not only for our program, but for them and their families and Clovis as a whole."

The Wildcats finished 8-4 last season, which ended with a loss to Cleveland in the state 6A semifinals, and now the rewards are coming for the talent and hard work leading to that success.

The Division I commitments by Harris and Phillips

followed that of Wildcats offensive lineman Bryce Cabeldue, who over the winter committed to play for the Kansas Jayhawks.

And there may be more to come for Clovis. Fullerton said he was recently contacted by Michigan University running backs coach/special teams coordinator Jay Harbaugh — son of current Michigan and former 49ers head coach Jim Harbaugh — inquiring about Clovis running back Jeston Webskowski, who will be a high school senior in August.

Fullerton said Harbaugh "happened to see

(Webskowski's) film one day and said he was intrigued by him."

And, according to Fullerton, Oklahoma State (which produced Hall of Fame running back Barry Sanders), Texas Tech and Fresno State have expressed interest in Webskowski, with the Red Raiders' recruiting coordinator having already started messaging the Wildcats running back.

"They are doing their homework, watching these kids' film," Fullerton said. "They're doing all kinds of recruiting, trying to figure out who fits best at certain

schools. ... I think Bryce getting that recognition made other schools realize that maybe there are some more kids in Clovis that can play Division I football. It's been a pretty neat deal."

And has made Fullerton's stay-at-home days plenty busy.

"People say they've had a lot of down time in this," Fullerton said, "but it seems every day I'm talking to a coach about a kid on my team."

On the basketball front, 6-foot Elida point guard Tyce

Delk announced that he will play college basketball for Division III University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Belton, Texas.

"Super excited and blessed to announce I will be continuing my athletic and academic career at the University of Mary Hardin Baylor!" Delk posted on Twitter on Sunday afternoon.

Elida went 22-8 last season, lost a triple-overtime heartbreaker to Tatum in the District 4-Class A championship game, and reached the state Class A quarterfinal round before losing to second-seeded Maxwell.

3 positive for COVID-19 at Retirement Ranch

□ All asymptomatic and are isolated.

CLOVIS — Following positive tests for two of its employees over the weekend, Retirement Ranch has tested all of its residents and staff and early returns showed one positive resident test.

Trisha Gross, social services director at the facility, said Tuesday afternoon that full results are still pending, but the facility received the positive resident test Monday night. The resident is asymptomatic, and has been put into isolation.

The facility tested 234 people through Sunday, which included all residents and 95% of its employees. The remaining employees had been tested as of Tuesday, officials said.

A new round of testing could be as early as this morning and hopefully within the week, Gross said, but the facility was still waiting on directives from the New Mexico Department of Health.

The two employees who

tested positive were asymptomatic, and were tested May 11 as part of a state request to test all residents and randomly test staff.

A total of 53 staffers and 41 residents had been tested through the testing periods of April 27 and May 11. The facility reported the two positive tests Saturday, five days after the second random testing.

Gross said Monday she didn't know who the employees were, and had no way to know how many shifts those employees had worked before they were sent into quarantine.

"Because it was random testing, we didn't anticipate anybody would come back positive, so they were allowed to come into work," Gross said. "We do screen everybody who comes into our building every single day for signs of the virus."

Screening includes temperature tests and a series of questions. Additional screening is required for any employee who travels out of town on their free time, and employees are asked to clear such travel through supervisors in advance.

Employees who test positive cannot return to work

until 14 days following the positive test along with at least two negative tests.

The Sunday tests were taken by the New Mexico National Guard to Tri-Core Labs in Albuquerque, County Manager Lance Pyle said.

This weekend was the first time since the pandemic began that area New Mexico senior centers had reported positive tests.

The facility has roughly 140 staffers, but Gross said she couldn't calculate how many employees are needed to operate the facility because "every department is different."

Residents have received cloth masks to use while outside of their room or in the presence of caregivers. Staff has gowns, face shields and gloves.

"We do try to maintain the six feet, which is difficult with care," Gross said. "We are encouraging extra hand washing and we have extra hand sanitizing stations all over the building."

The facility is currently operating under its policies for infection control, but many of those items had already been handed down by the state.

This notice is authorized by the Court to inform you about an agreement to settle a class action lawsuit that may affect you. The lawsuit alleges that the University of New Mexico failed to administer proper treatment protocols to pediatric Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia patients treated at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center or Hospital ("UNM") between January 1, 1977, and March 31, 1997. The settlement covers pediatric cancer patients who died as recently as December 1, 2019.

The Defendant UNM says that it has done nothing wrong. The Court has not decided who is right because the parties agreed to a settlement. The Court has given preliminary approval to this settlement. The Court will have a hearing to decide whether to finally approve the settlement.

Who is included in the settlement? You may be a Class Member if you are a family member or beneficiary of a deceased pediatric cancer patient diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia who was treated at UNM between January 1, 1977 and March 31, 1997 and who died on or before December 1, 2019.

What is the case about? This lawsuit is principally about whether pediatric cancer patients who were treated for Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia at the UNM between January 1, 1977, and March 31, 1997, were given proper care.

What does the settlement provide? The University of New Mexico has agreed to create a fund of \$38,050,000.00 to be divided among all Class members. The Settlement Agreement, available at the website below, describes all the details of the proposed settlement.

Your share of the fund will depend on the number of valid claims that are submitted by eligible Decedent Class Members, whether a deceased pediatric cancer patient has more than one statutory beneficiary entitled to compensation, the total amount of claims administration expenses, taxes, service awards to the named Plaintiffs in the case, and attorneys' fees and expenses.

How do you ask for a payment? A detailed notice contains all available information. Please visit the website listed below to get one.

You should submit a Claim Form once the claim filing process begins if you believe you are entitled to compensation under the settlement. You may learn how to register to receive a claim form by consulting the website described below.

What are your other options? If you do not want to be legally bound by the settlement, you must exclude yourself by **JULY 6, 2020** or you will not be able to sue, or continue to sue, UNM about the legal claims in this case. If you exclude yourself, you cannot get money from this settlement. If you stay in the settlement you may object to it by filing an objection by **JULY 6, 2020**. The detailed notice explains how to exclude yourself or object.

The Court will hold a hearing in this case (*Cummings v. Board of Regents of the University of New Mexico, et al.*, Cause No. CV 2001-00579 (as consolidated with Cause No CV 2001-01409)) on **JULY 28, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.** to consider whether to approve: (1) the settlement, (2) the awards to the Class Plaintiffs, and (3) the request by the lawyers, representing all Class members, for up to 35 percent of the settlement fund as fees and the reimbursement of reasonable expenses.

You may ask to appear at the hearing, either on behalf of yourself or through a representative, but it is not required. The hearing will take place at: Second Judicial District, Bernalillo County Courthouse, Albuquerque, NM 87102

How will we respond to PFAS threats?

The quality of our water in eastern New Mexico is threatened by man-made chemical compounds named Polyfluoroalkyl Substances, commonly known as “PFAS,” used by the U.S. Air Force at Cannon Air Force Base as fire-fighting foam.

These chemicals are toxic and are linked to health issues including cancer, birth defects, autoimmune diseases, high blood pressure and more.

Over the past 50 years, the Air Force has washed nearly 18 million gallons of PFAS solutions into our region’s groundwater. It slowly seeped into our private and municipal water wells. As a result, our treasured Ogallala Aquifer, providing water to Curry and Roosevelt Counties, is now tainted.

In 2018, the Air Force announced that these PFAS compounds were in the groundwater at a level we now know is 370 times above those established by the EPA as safe. This means that every two months, those drinking this water received the amount of PFAS in their water deemed safe for one’s entire lifetime.

We learned in February that EPCOR was taking steps to stop its presence in the water delivered to the city of Clovis from wells six miles away from Cannon.

Is our water safe? What can be done? With the help of our New Mexico Senators Stuart Ingle and Pat Woods, the state’s budget for 2021 includes \$100,000 for New Mexico Environment Department testing in the affected areas.

That’s a start in defining boundaries of the plume.

In addition, we as a group of local concerned residents have formed the Clean Water Partnership-Cannon, a non-profit association, to investigate the problem, fund water and blood tests for residents concerned about their own condition, examine soil toxicities, and find solutions to the contamination.

This includes educating the public about PFAS dangers and advocating for the interests of Curry and Roosevelt County residents to both state and federal governments.

In order for this effort to succeed, it’s going to take the people of Clovis, Portales and surrounding areas to come together to stop the intrusion of this “forever chemical” in our water supplies.

We must begin not only the testing of the water, but the clean-up of our contaminated water and the testing of our citizens immediately.

We support the presence of the Air Force in eastern New Mexico, and welcome its personnel, but believe that the Defense Department and the Air Force have abiding responsibilities to protect those in our community.

It has been two years since the Air Force advised of PFAS contamination locally, but they’ve taken no action whatsoever to address the problem.

Fortunately, there is American-made technology that purifies water contaminated with PFAS. Having access to safe and abundant water is an American right. We choose to stand up for our community and protect our health, economy, and environment, but most importantly our families.

As the board of directors of the Clean Water Partnership-Cannon, we ask you as members of our communities, to join us in this effort today.

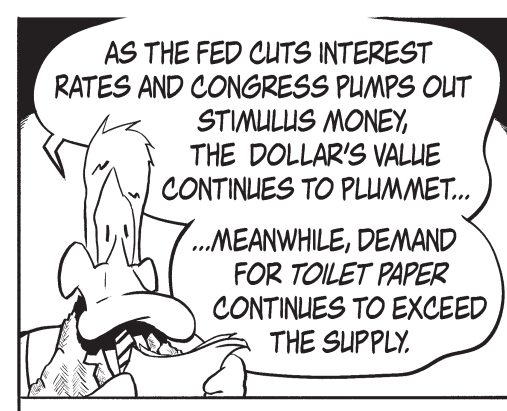
To the idealists, I say, as you run that risk of disillusionment, you’ll still be contributing to a better world. It’s no small thing to believe in the greater good — and a higher power.

There are opportunities in this moment. Great opportunities, if you’ve a mind to seize them.

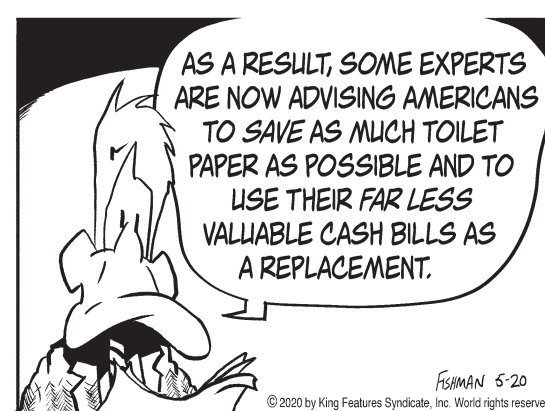
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Texas reopening — except Amarillo area

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott continued this week to reopen businesses that had closed to slow the spread of novel coronavirus. Phase 2, as he calls it, will allow tattoo parlors, bars and daycare centers to begin reopening.

But the dates vary by each industry. And while the new order applies to the entire state, four Texas Panhandle counties — Deaf Smith, Moore, Potter, and Randall — will be delayed by over one week because of ongoing COVID-19 outbreaks. Here's what you need to know.

What's the problem in the Panhandle?

The number of positive cases have skyrocketed in recent weeks.

Amarillo had 1,482 positive cases on May 11. On Monday, state health officials said that number had nearly doubled, to 2,731. Deaths have climbed from 18 to 27.

Closer to eastern New Mexico, the Hereford area went from 59 cases on May 11 to 122 on Monday. The Hereford area has also recorded six coronavirus-related deaths in the past week.

Parmer County, which includes Bovina, Friona and Farwell, is still allowed to reopen under Abbott's newest plan, but it too has seen multiple new cases — from just four three weeks ago, to 34

through Monday.

Judge Trey Ellis said most of those testing positive in Parmer County are closely associated with each other — family and friends. Most of the patients are not hospitalized and are staying home, but they're also allowing visitors, spurring the number of positive cases.

Outside the Amarillo area, what is reopening right now?

Some businesses can open immediately. Those include childcare and daycare centers. Massage establishments, tattoo parlors and piercing studios can also reopen, so long as there's six feet between operating workstations.

What comes next?

On Friday, restaurants statewide can begin operating at 50% capacity, though the cap does not apply to outdoor areas. Bars can open at 25% capacity, as can aquariums, natural caverns, rodeos and equestrian events. Bowling alleys can also reopen, provided there's six feet between operating lanes. Amateur sporting events can proceed without spectators, but participants have to test negative for COVID-19 before the event, among other requirements. Drive-in concerts are also allowed.

On May 29, outdoor areas of zoos can open at 25% capacity.

On May 31, professional basketball, baseball, soft-

ball, golf, tennis, football, and car racing events can resume without any spectators present. Youth camps, including those that keep children overnight, can also reopen. Practice for youth sports programs can resume, but games can't begin until June 15.

What about schools?

On June 1, public school districts can offer in-person activities, such as summer school, special education evaluations and individualized tutoring. Private schools and institutions of higher education are also allowed to reopen campuses.

On KXAS-TV Monday night, Abbott said in a pre-vaccine world, classrooms

still might be able to open with "new safety standards in place." But if that's not possible, he added, "We want to be able to open up to be prepared for possible continuation of some distance-learning strategies that were adopted at the end of the school year."

Do I have to wear a mask?

Texas officials recommend everyone wear a mask, but there is no statewide requirement. Cities and counties cannot penalize anyone for not wearing a face covering.

Clovis' Richard Rowley presented the award to Cagle and recounted his contributions to UNM, which went back to the



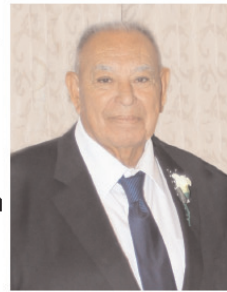
early 1930s when he was president of several campus organizations and one of the school's top athletes.

available testing," said Dan Heerding, the emergency management coordinator for the city of Clovis.

"DOH (New Mexico Department of Health) won't tell us where the cases are from other than a ZIP code. They cite HIPAA (privacy) laws as the reason."

Neither Curry nor Roosevelt counties has reported a COVID-19 related death and, even with Saturday's spike, both are still below the state average in the number of cases per-100,000 population.

The number of tests the state has performed has increased dramatically in recent weeks — from 71,118 on May 1 to 137,620 through Monday.

The number of recovered cases in the state has also increased of late — from 785 on May 1 to 1,796 through Monday.

Before the 16 cases reported in Curry-Roosevelt counties on Saturday, the single-day high was five on April 30.

More good news: The lone COVID-19 patient admitted to Clovis' Plains

Regional Medical Center since the pandemic began was discharged on Saturday, hospital spokeswoman Amanda Schoenberg said.

If the weekend becomes the norm, area hospital officials have said they are ready.

"Since the onset of the pandemic, RGH has been preparing for a possible outbreak," Orrantia said. "At this time, we have an appropriate supply of masks, beds and ventilators but depending on the scope of the outbreak it could change rapidly. Staff meet daily to discuss where we are, and future plans and needs. During this time, we have learned to adapt to the changes as they occur."

One change has been the availability of testing, which some area businesses are embracing.

Farmers Country Market in Portales was closed part of the weekend to provide testing for its staff.

"It was routine testing at Farmers on Sunday," Hamilton said. "It's employees doing what they feel is in the best interest of their employees. We're seeing more of the employers seeking out testing throughout the county."

"The community has been really fantastic," she said. "We have people making masks (for residents); if anyone can continue to do that it would be fantastic."

"If anyone wants to send them cards or letters, they get mail every day and they really look forward to that. If Sunday school groups, church groups could send encouraging words that would be nice."

Tweedy said the Center has three iPads that rotate among residents. "If anyone would like to donate iPads or tablets or just any (electronic devices) for them to play games on, that would be incredible."

Notice of a class action settlement authorized by State of New Mexico, County of Bernalillo, Second Judicial District Court

This notice is authorized by the Court to inform you about an agreement to settle a class action lawsuit that may affect you. The lawsuit alleges that the University of New Mexico failed to administer proper treatment protocols to pediatric Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia patients treated at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center or Hospital ("UNM") between January 1, 1977, and March 31, 1997. The settlement covers pediatric cancer patients who died as recently as December 1, 2019.

The Defendant UNM says that it has done nothing wrong. The Court has not decided who is right because the parties agreed to a settlement. The Court has given preliminary approval to this settlement. The Court will have a hearing to decide whether to finally approve the settlement on **July 28, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.**

Who is included in the settlement? You may be a Class Member if you are a family member or beneficiary of a deceased pediatric cancer patient diagnosed with ALL who was treated at UNM between January 1, 1977 and March 31, 1997 and who died on or before December 1, 2019. This lawsuit is principally about whether pediatric cancer patients who were treated for ALL at the UNM between January 1, 1977, and March 31, 1997, were given proper care.

What does the settlement provide? The University of New Mexico has agreed to create a fund of \$38,050,000.00 to be divided among all Class members. The Settlement Agreement, available at the website below, describes all the details of the proposed settlement.

Your share of the fund will depend on the number of valid claims that are submitted by eligible Decedent Class Members, whether a deceased pediatric cancer patient has more than one statutory beneficiary entitled to compensation, the total amount of claims administration expenses, taxes, service awards to the named Plaintiffs in the case, and attorneys' fees and expenses.

PORTALES — Three candidates, one the incumbent, are on the June 2 primary ballot to be the Republican nominee for Roosevelt County probate judge.

The winner of the primary does not have any general election opposition from the Democratic or Libertarian parties. Michelle Bargas is the incumbent, with Gracy Stone and Kendall Terry running for the position as well.

The judge handles the formal judicial process for transferring the property of a person who has died. The salary for the term will be \$20,024.

Michelle Bargas

Occupation: Roosevelt County Probate Judge

Prior or current elected offices held: 2005 President, BESO (Bilingual Education Student Organization); 2009-2012 Treasurer, Union County Crime Stoppers; 2018-2019 Vice-Chairperson, Probate Affiliate for New Mexico Association of Counties

What experience do you have that will prepare you for the upcoming four years?

Prior to the last four years, I worked for the state as a juvenile probation parole officer. During those 10 years, I earned experience in the courtroom speaking before numerous judges on cases. The last four years has given me experience with probate law and working with county government.

What do you believe should be the role of government, and do you believe anything changes during a pandemic?

The role of government should be to protect us and our rights but not at a level that hinders us. As for the pandemic, through this experience, a lot has changed. Being quarantined for two months and not allowing businesses to operate during that time changes everything.

How will you run the office in a way that's efficient without sacrificing taxpayer service?

The probate office has a set budget. There is no secretary, no office staff and the probate office has a budget for office supplies of \$100 a year. Currently, the probate office is highly efficient due to the fact that I handle appointments one day a week and meet families when convenient for them. The community can reach me by leaving a message on my office phone (575-226-3995) or cell phone (575-760-7605).

As difficult as it is to imagine Jan. 1 right now, what do you envision to be the biggest challenge of the office you're seeking?

The biggest challenge is educating the community on what the probate office does do. Roosevelt County has a resource available and not a lot of people know what it is or how to use it. I would like to use the next four years to work on educating the public on utilizing this resource and show how it benefits them. I would like to start planning some informational classes on probate law and how it benefits the community.

Probate judges are authorized, but not required, to perform marriages. Following the state's decision to allow same-sex marriage, various judges decided to stop performing all marriages. Would your office perform a same-sex marriage, and if not do you believe the office is providing full service to taxpayers?

I do perform marriages and when you agree to perform marriages, you agree to perform all types of marriages.

Regardless of the primary outcome, you will be in your current position for the next six months. Should you win, what do you plan to do over the next six months to ensure your next term is successful?

I am planning on locating places to start scheduling classes on probate law and the benefits of it for the community. Hopefully, the quarantine will end soon and businesses will be able to function at full capacity again so we can look forward to a positive future.

Should you be defeated in the primary, what would you do in those six months to ensure taxpayers are best served?

As soon as the quarantine is lifted, I will still look into scheduling probate classes for the next six months. I believe in being proactive rather than reactive.

What do you believe should be the role of government and do you believe anything changes during a pandemic?

If I have the great opportunity to be the next probate judge for Roosevelt County, I will operate the probate office in the most

efficient and productive manner as possible. I will establish set office hours, post and make available informative probate judge information and forms on the county's website, and be available to meet county residents by appointment if necessary. I also plan to implement new and proactive ideas that will help county residents with probate law.

As difficult as it is to imagine Jan. 1 right now, what do you envision to be the biggest challenge of the office you're seeking? How do you plan to address it?

The biggest challenge I see is COVID-19 issues and the economic impact that it will have on the entire state of New Mexico. I would use common sense and a conservative platform to alleviate these and any unforeseen problems.

Probate judges are authorized, but not required, to perform marriages. Following the state's decision to allow same-sex marriages, various judges decided to stop performing all marriages. Would your office perform a same-sex marriage, and if not do you believe the office is providing full service to taxpayers?

I would not perform marriages if elected probate judge. It is of my opinion that duties of the probate judge court are to appoint legally qualified persons (called personal representatives) to manage and settle the decedent's business affairs. Personal representatives pass the deceased person's estate property — real and personal — to the rightful recipients. Clergy, magistrate judge, municipal judge, and/or district judge can perform marriages in New Mexico.

For this position, the Republican primary is the only contested one and there are no nominees signed up for the Democratic or Libertarian parties. Should you win the primary, what will you do to ensure a smooth transition?

■ Prioritizing: Identify the probate judge office priorities, identify the resources needed to achieve these priorities, and communicate these goals and priorities.

■ Build relationships and support: I would build support within our county government, community leaders outside of government, and implement productive community relations.

■ Actively manage office time: Implement office hours on a regular basis, improve and enhance the probate judge department on the Roosevelt County website.

Candidate Q&A: Roosevelt County Commission District 2

PORTALES — There are two candidates in the June 2 Republican primary for the District 2 slot on the Roosevelt County Commission.

The winner faces no opposition in the November general election. Matthew Hunton, the incumbent, is running against Rodney Savage.

The position pays \$22,832 annually.

Matthew Hunton

Occupation: Insurance agent/business owner

Prior or current elected offices held: Portales City Council, 2012-16. Roosevelt County Commission, 2017-present.

What experience do you have that will prepare you for the upcoming four years?

Being a city councilor for four years greatly decreased my learning curve as a commissioner. Being a commissioner for the last three-plus years leaves no learning curve to continue in my current position. I am comfortable with the way the system works and will be able to continue helping move Roosevelt County forward in a responsible way. I appreciate hearing from citizens and know the process to work with them to address their issues. My fellow commissioners voted me chair of the commission this year and that has brought on additional insights to the position.

What do you believe should be the role of government, and do you believe anything changes during a pandemic?

County government's only role should be maintaining fiscal responsibility to allow

for the essential services our citizens need such as safety and infrastructure improvements. We have many state-mandated expenses that must be taken in to consideration, which makes our job difficult from time to time. Should a pandemic arise I believe the county government's role should include discussion and creation of a plan with state officials to move our local area forward.

Commissioners are most visible during twice-monthly public meetings, but most of the legwork happens outside of those meetings. What kind of time commitments can you make to the position outside of meetings, and what do you plan to do during those hours?

Through my seven years of public service I have not had any issues committing the time and have been able to give it my all. I balance life, work, and commission very well. This includes trips to Santa Fe during legislative sessions to bring back capital outlay money, as well as additional meetings that come up such as community development block grant, budget and fleet workshops, commission meetings, and others. In addition, I'm always available to the citizens I represent be it to drive a road that might be deteriorating or discuss county business.

As difficult as it is to imagine Jan. 1 right now, what do you envision to be the biggest challenge of the office you're seeking? How do you plan to address it?

The biggest challenge without a doubt will be budget. I will use my business background and knowledge of government to responsibly move forward to have a balanced budget without giving up essential services that our citizens need.

Regardless of the primary outcome,

you will be in your current position for the next six months. Should you win, what do you plan to do over the next six months to ensure your next term is successful? Should you be defeated in the primary, what would you do in those six months to ensure taxpayers are best served?

Due to the current circumstances, win or lose, our next six months will be about creating and monitoring the budget. We expect to have a tremendous downward trend in revenues for the next 18 to 24 months. I will continue to work hard to make sure our county government stays solvent.

Rodney Savage

Occupation: Retired agriculture educator and FFA advisor. I taught 26 years of grades 7-12 at Portales High School and 12 years at Elida High School. I am currently a self-employed rental property owner.

Prior or current elected offices held: After retirement I was elected to the Portales Municipal School board where I have served for 18 years and continue to serve. During this time I have held various offices including serving two terms as president. I also served eight years on the New Mexico FFA Board of Governors.

What experience do you have that will prepare you for the upcoming four years?

As a Portales school board member for 18 years and serving on the budget and audit committees I have gained valuable experience in budget and audit approval while contributing to a team effort. I have

received over 100 hours training at the New Mexico School Board Association conferences relating to issues such as superintendent search, budget and finance, strategic planning, and legislative advocacy. I have had the opportunity to interact with legislators annually at state and Region Six board meetings advocating and lobbying legislators for local control.

What do you believe should be the role of government, and do you believe anything changes during a pandemic?

I believe the role of government should be that of a facilitator or catalyst to make things easier and more efficient for those whom we are elected to serve. To me government boils down to serving the people and protecting our constitutional rights. And no, that role does not change during a pandemic. Leadership is not about me, it is about them.

Commissioners are most visible during twice-monthly meetings, but most of the leg work happens outside those meetings. What kind of time commitments can you make to the position outside of meetings and what do you plan to do during those hours?

Being retired from teaching and self-employed offers the advantage of being highly approachable and available to work at all times. I plan to travel throughout my district to meet people, listen to their issues and gain first-hand knowledge of road conditions and infrastructure.

As difficult as it is to imagine Jan. 1 right now, what do you envision the biggest challenge of the office you are seeking? How do you plan to address it?

We must get our economy back as soon as possible. I believe whether it be

as individual citizens or an organized/elected body such as the county commission, we must avail every opportunity to push back against unconstitutional mandates that are stifling our community. And yes, we must all act in a safe manner and use common sense.

With oil and gas revenues plummeting and decreased taxable income from the agriculture and business sectors it will be a challenge to prepare a balanced budget without cutting personnel and putting even more people out of work.

For this position, the Republican primary is the only contested one and there are no nominees signed up for the Democratic or Libertarian primary races. Should you win the primary, what will you do over the six months to ensure a smooth transition?

I plan to read the meeting agendas and minutes posted on the Roosevelt County Commission website and attend all commission meetings as well. I also plan to begin calling on residents in my district to learn of their issues and concerns ... this will remain my highest priority. I also believe it is important to familiarize myself with neighboring counties and their issues and perhaps how they have solved them. I will attend any training sessions provided by the New Mexico Association of Counties. I will continue to serve my county by attending Fair Board meetings and serve as goat show superintendent. I also see an opportunity to improve the working relationship between the Commission and other entities such as local law enforcement, Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Cattle Growers, Farm Bureau, RCEC, the Fair Board, the City Council, and Chamber of Commerce.

I'm writing this on a warm morning, settled in near the air conditioner with outside temperatures already well past 90 degrees and climbing.

This was always a hopeful time of year when I was a kid. School was out — or we were breathlessly counting the minutes. The garden was planted. Our old mossy swimming tank was freshly filled with ice-cold water. We were close enough to watermelon season to taste them.

We grew up without air conditioning. Our mother

had a strange aversion to new inventions. For long years while others were living in the comfort of mechanically chilled air, she swore off the idea. She had a similar aversion to dishwashers.

When summer came, every window in the house was open for the duration.

A large and noisy turquoise blue box fan had a permanent place in the hallway where it ran from mid-morning until bedtime.

When my brothers and I crouched behind it and yelled through the whirling blades, it twisted our voices and amused us endlessly.

During an intensive hot spell, our parents installed a leaky evaporative cooler in one of their bedroom windows, which meant that one — and only one — room in our house had cooler air.

A window unit swamp cooler is better than nothing

if the outside air stays dry. In the event of humidity (which does happen now and again), not much cooling takes place.

Occasionally we piled into the station wagon to visit one of our mom's best friends about 20 miles away. Bobbie had a magical machine: the first refrigerated air conditioner I remember.

It was installed in the north wall of her living room, about eye level to a kid. The front grill was festooned with wind power demonstrating plastic rib-

bons that probably came with it from the store, the kind that stood straight out like flags in an eastern New Mexico sandstorm.

Bobbie had a chair or a couch just below that marvelous cooler. I remember sitting on my knees with icy wind blowing through my hair. It was pure bliss.

By the time we were in junior high or so, we made the transition to a giant swamp cooler on top of the house and, eventually, converted to two small refrigerated units. If I turn them on early enough on a sizzling

day, they keep the whole house tolerable.

(In the interest of full disclosure, we eventually invested in a dishwasher, too, against my mother's wishes. Like air conditioning, it became immediately indispensable.)

Yep, summer seems to be arriving. It's time to switch on those ceiling fans, too. While you're up, will you bring me an iced tea?

Let's hope it happens this year.

Curry County commissioners in the next few weeks will have to decide if the COVID-19 pandemic will prevent us from celebrating one of our favorite annual community festivals. Deadlines for vendor contracts are coming up and — if signed — County Manager Lance Pyle said taxpayers could lose more than \$100,000 if the virus prevents us from enjoying the livestock shows, tejano music and carnival rides as planned the week of Aug. 10.

The only fair concern in recent memory has been the weather. It almost always rains during the county fair. Usually it rains hard. Hails too. And the wind blows. We don't care. We have corn dogs to consume.

County officials tell us this would be the 100th Curry County Fair, based on the formation of a fair board of directors in 1920.

Such a milestone deserves a look back at its history.

The county fair dates to the birth of Curry County in 1909 — and even before that. In fact, a 1914 article in The Clovis Journal reported the “seventh annual Curry County Fair” had taken place that year — remarkable since the county was only 5 years old.

And it was a mainstay for two-plus decades.

But on Oct. 4, 1930, the Clovis Evening News-Journal reported that the 1930 county fair had seen fewer exhibits than normal.

A few months later, the newspaper reported the Curry County Farm Bureau had authorized a “substantial” loan to the Curry County Fair Association because of the fair's financial woes.

Apparently the loan did not help. There was no Curry County Fair in 1931.

In July 1932, the Clovis Lions Club gathered to discuss sponsoring a rebirth of the fair.

“Question of promoting a county fair this fall was brought up by R.V. Miller,” the club reporter wrote. But the topic was tabled “after a short discussion that indicated unfavorable action.”

If Curry County had a fair the next few years, it received no coverage in the local paper.

What did receive plenty of coverage in the Clovis paper was

the annual Roosevelt County Fair, which even hosted a well-attended Clovis Day.

In November 1939, the Clovis paper reported on another attempt to revive the county fair. A “Bi-State Fair” committee met, but ended with “gloomy” prospects, according to the newspaper's headline.

“We're tired of begging and high pressuring to get operating funds,” an anonymous committee member told the newspaper. “... Clovis doesn't care enough about the matters to keep it going.”

And so there was no Curry County Fair in 1939 or anytime during the 1940s.

Finally, in the late 1940s, taxpayers approved funds to create the Curry County Fairgrounds south of the railroad tracks where it remains today.

In 1951, the Curry County Fair returned, and we embraced it.

Several thousand people

attended that four-day funfest and the Clovis News-Journal headline reported it closed on a “Cheerful, Festive Note.”

“(O)bservers on all sides pointed out the fair was an outstanding success.” It even made money, the paper reported.

The only problem with the fair's triumphant return was the weather. High winds “turned the fairgrounds into a miniature dust bowl,” the newspaper noted.

What a surprise.

Despite that, plans were launched immediately for “an even bigger and better fair in 1952.”

Curry County has hosted a fair every year since then.

Rich, poor, tall, short, masked, unmasked — we could all use another one about now.

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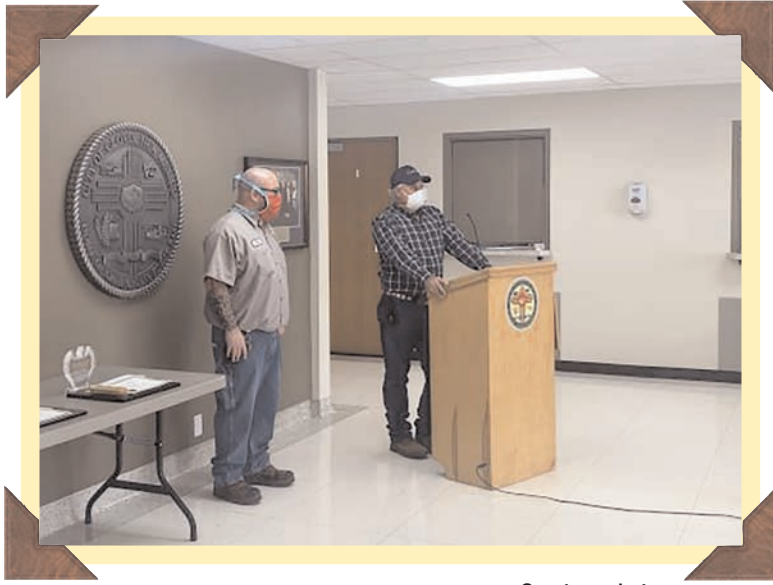

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'Judge not' makes most sense of any rule

Just for the record, it might be worth mentioning that "sheltering in place" is what we're not doing.

Forgive me, please. I am far too much in love with freedom to turn anyone over to the COVID-19 police. I won't be scowling at you if I meet you pushing your basket the wrong way down the jelly aisle at the supermarket. Besides that, it'll probably be me swimming upstream; I seem to be clueless when it comes to noticing arrows on floors.

Nor will I cast a masked smirk at you if I see you mask-less behind your cart, becalmed in the aisle, not moving in any direction as you "ponder in place," wondering whether store brand green beans are as good as Libby's (pretty much, yes) or generic peanut butter is as tasty as Peter Pan's (not even close.)

In Texas, where I live, you can still make your own decision about that. Not peanut butter. Masks.

So far, I've consistently chosen to take a mask with me every time I've gone to the grocery store. And I've consistently chosen to keep it in my pocket. Mostly because we've had just handful of COVID-19 cases in our county and half a handful have already recovered.

I know this could change quickly, and that's probably a good reason to wear a mask at the store. Would I wear a mask in a store in New York City? Yes, indeed. Would I wear a mask at a store in a much smaller, less virus-besieged city if everybody else in the store wore a mask? Probably so.

We may not have

achieved "herd immunity," but I'm still part of a herd.

In this strange time, what is a customer saying if he or she walks into a store or church or "essential business" liquor store masked or mask-less (and is not robbing the latter)? I mean, what's he saying in a city where no laws are in place about masks or, for that matter, whether you can buy a 32-ounce soda?

I don't know. And neither do you. I think we'd be wise to "judge not, lest ye be judged." We don't know if the masked person is sick, medically compromised, careful, neurotic, wise, scared, smart, smug, self-righteous, considerate, "virtue-signaling," a wonderful and thoughtful human being, a jerk, or a lot older than the unmasked portion of their face looks.

And we all know wise medical folks who tell us, "Here's the evidence thus far, and here's what I'd recommend."

Resounding yes? Resounding no? No, not terribly resounding. So mask-wearers and non-mask wearers are usually best advised, I think, to wear some humility. It looks good on us and protects us from an affliction worse than COVID-19 anytime, even as we're not sheltering in place.

I'm not the English usage police, either. I think I can live with occasionally turning "shelter" into a verb. But "sheltering in place," as I understand it,

actually means to stay in the closet until the bullets quit flying, or not sticking your nose out of the storm shelter until the tornado has flown away and the "all clear" is given.

It must be terribly difficult, but you're not technically "sheltering in place" even if you're going stir-crazy staring at your over-priced and claustrophobia-inducing apartment walls in New York City, but still putting on a mask and emerging occasionally for some useful purpose like buying food or just to take a walk to avoid full-blown psychosis.

To borrow a musical metaphor, "sheltering in place" is fortissimo and only a few measures long. "Stay at home" is forte and can seem like forever. And "safer at home," a nuisance and not a storm shelter, is semi-forte and certainly not normalissimo (don't look either of those up).

Misuse the term if you want to, but if you start out at -issimo don't blame me if you want to get a lot louder and have already limited your linguistic options. I promise not to call storm troopers from the EUP (English Usage Police).

I'm about to mask up. Always do when I mow the yard. But, as I write, our county's COVID-19 cases are passing two handfuls. A mask at the store, even if you don't intend to rob the place, is making more sense.

But "judge not" makes the best sense of all.

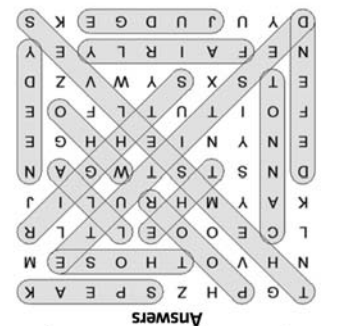

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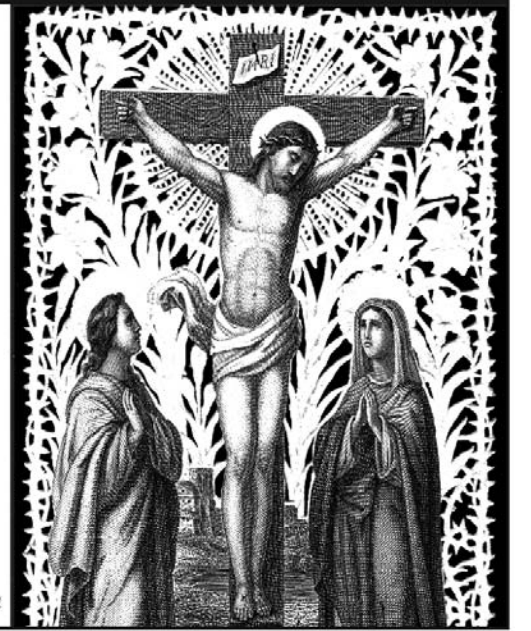

Curry approves preliminary budget

CLOVIS — There's still plenty of data Curry County has no idea about for the 2020-21 fiscal year. But there's no question the county will have less money to work with as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Commissioners approved on Tuesday a preliminary budget of \$32.618 million — a decrease of \$8.6 million from the current fiscal year.

County Manager Lance Pyle noted that gross receipts taxes from March were off by 13.5% from March 2019. Since many business restrictions began in mid-March, Pyle estimates the next few months will be off between 27% and 30%.

Gross receipts taxes make up 39.3% of the county budget, with 52.4% coming from property tax and the rest coming from various fees and earned interest.

Going forward, Pyle said, the county will be on a hiring freeze and will not increase salaries.

Every county department took some variety of cuts in the new budget, but Pyle said he believed the cuts were balanced.

The preliminary budget is due to the state at the end of May, and work on the final budget will stretch into July.

"You will see quite a few changes from what's just been presented to you," Pyle said.

In other business during the Tuesday meeting:

■ Commissioners removed restrictions from a 1/8 percent

gross receipts tax increment that was first established in 1991 as an environmental tax.

The county has more than \$1 million in the account, and Pyle noted it would go to general fund expenses.

Commissioner Seth Martin, who would like to rescind the tax, asked when that would be possible. Pyle said commissioners could act before either Oct. 1 to end the tax on Jan. 1 or March 31 next year to end the tax on July 1.

■ The commission agreed to pay the remaining \$406,212 on the county's loan to purchase property on Gidding Street that now houses its administrative complex.

By paying the loan balance 10 years early, Finance Director Carol Pipes said, the county saves \$109,000 in interest.

■ A \$5,000 capital expense was approved for sound system repairs at the county fairgrounds.

■ Commissioners approved a \$6,800 Census outreach effort for Christian Believers. Nikki Lovett, a community services administrator for the county, said the county had a previous agreement with Christian Believers but never spent the money because public health orders forced the cancellation of planned activities.

Lovett said at last look, the self-response rate for the county was around 47%.

■ The county approved an ordinance to handle smoking at county facilities to align with state guidelines.

Sheriff Wesley Waller asked the county provide outdoor smoking areas at the fairgrounds, and noted

that past enforcement is usually resolved before citations are necessary.

■ Martin reported he attended Texico High's graduation ceremony Sunday evening in the rear parking lot of Faith Christian Family Church. While he would have preferred a traditional graduation, he thanked the governor's office for allowing the outdoor event to happen.

"Little steps help a lot," Martin said. "It was good overall, and I believe everything turned out safe. The kids and the staff at Texico got closure in a good way, and I'd like to thank Santa Fe for allowing that to happen."

■ The next meeting is scheduled for 9 a.m. June 2, tentatively at the Curry County Administrative Complex.

Commissioners get COVID-19 insight

CLOVIS — Curry County commissioners got no guarantees on what state public health orders would be a few days from now, let alone the next few weeks during the COVID-19 pandemic.

But commissioners did get some insight from Brian Moore, co-chair of Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's Economic Advisory Council, during their Tuesday morning meeting.

Moore, a grocery store owner in Clayton, told commissioners he feels like he and co-chair Christina Campos represent the smaller populations of the state's eastern side while most of the council comes from larger cities. Campos is a hospital administrator in Santa Rosa.

The state, Moore said, is seeking a transmission rate — meaning the average amount one person infects — of 1.15 statewide. The state is running around 1.22, and the east side of the state running at 1.06 has helped justify some of the early health order relaxation. He's hoping restaurants can offer dine-in service around June 1, but notes it's not his call.

"She's really data driven," Moore said of

Lujan Grisham. "Of course, she came from a public health background. When I first met her (as a legislator), she was secretary of health."

Moore said in general, the state looks at data on Tuesday and announces decisions on Wednesdays because, "we can't wait until Friday and call all of the restaurants; it doesn't work that way."

The biggest three concerns the governor's office generally has are:

■ Daily tests. The goal is 5,000 per day, and last week the state was at around 4,900 daily.

■ Contact tracing, which is difficult with privacy issues. "They just try to get somebody in a room and ask them everybody they've been with," Moore said. "That's not efficient or sustainable."

■ Intensive care unit bed capacity. Most counties are fine in this regard, though Bernalillo has had to take on overflows from McKinley County.

Moore is hopeful to have directives soon on events with large groups, like the Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta and county fairs. Commission Chairman Ben McDaniel said he'd appreciate that guidance as soon as possible, as Curry has more fair contracts than normal due to a 100th-year celebration.

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Clovis to look at refinancing bonds

CLOVIS — City commissioners will look at more than \$500,000 in savings to refinance two bonds over the next 22 years, and an opportunity exists to frontload the savings.

Their 5:15 p.m. meeting at the North Annex of the Clovis-Carver Library will be virtual due to public health orders regarding mass gatherings during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The meeting will be broadcast on Suddenlink Channel 10, cityofclovis.org and the city Facebook page. Questions can be called in to 575-763-9200.

A resolution put before the commission calls for a \$9 million loan agreement with the New Mexico Finance Authority toward a 2010

loan for wastewater treatment plant improvements and a 2011 loan that funded the purchase of Colonial Park Golf Course and various other parks and recreation projects.

“With interest rates being low,” Clovis City Manager Justin Howalt said, “we’re looking at the ability to restructure or refinance those 2010 and 2011 series loans.”

The city would have two possible options on each loan:

■ A simple refinancing at a lower rate, which would save roughly \$323,000 on the 2010 loan and \$221,000 on the 2011 loan. The loans expire in 2030 and 2031, respectively.

■ Adding a year of debt service payment to each loan, which would still result in a lower interest rate but frontload much of the \$570,000 in savings to the first two years.

The extended loans would expire in 2031 and 2032.

The process, Howalt explained, is similar to when a finance company offers to waive a December car or home payment and extend the loan period by a month. The customer gets holiday spending money, while the lender gets to compound more interest on the briefly frozen principal. In this case, the holiday equals the upcoming years with finances expected to be tight due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The commission will also consider a resolution to provide hoteliers relief by reducing sewer fees — allowed in state statute for structures that are vacant. The hotels have been forced to operate at lower occupancies, first 50% and followed by 25%, by state public

health orders. The measure is expected to cost the city about \$4,500 monthly.

Other items on the Thursday agenda include:

■ Disbursement of lodgers’ tax funds as determined in the advisory board’s May 12 meeting.

A total of \$81,265 is recommended, including \$25,000 for the Curry County Fair, \$13,300 for the Christmas Lights Parade, \$28,000 for advertisements in state tourism magazines, \$8,000 for the holiday bazaar and \$6,965 for the Double Dash barrel race.

■ A \$59,213.13 agreement with Consensus Planning to create a metropolitan redevelopment area plan. The city has been awarded \$50,000 from the state toward the work.

■ A request to allow alcohol

sales in Hillcrest Park for the 575 Food Fest and Under Over Festival, which are both scheduled for 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 17.

■ A request to award Region V Drug Task Force coordinator duties to Roger Grah. He was the only applicant for the contract, which will be for one year with three additional renewal options. The contract amount is still to be negotiated.

■ A bulk diesel contract with Farwell Fuels for \$1.0728 per gallon. The city uses approximately 7,500 gallons monthly.

■ A letter of support in Curry County’s application for Community Development Block Grant funding for Curry Road 11 work.

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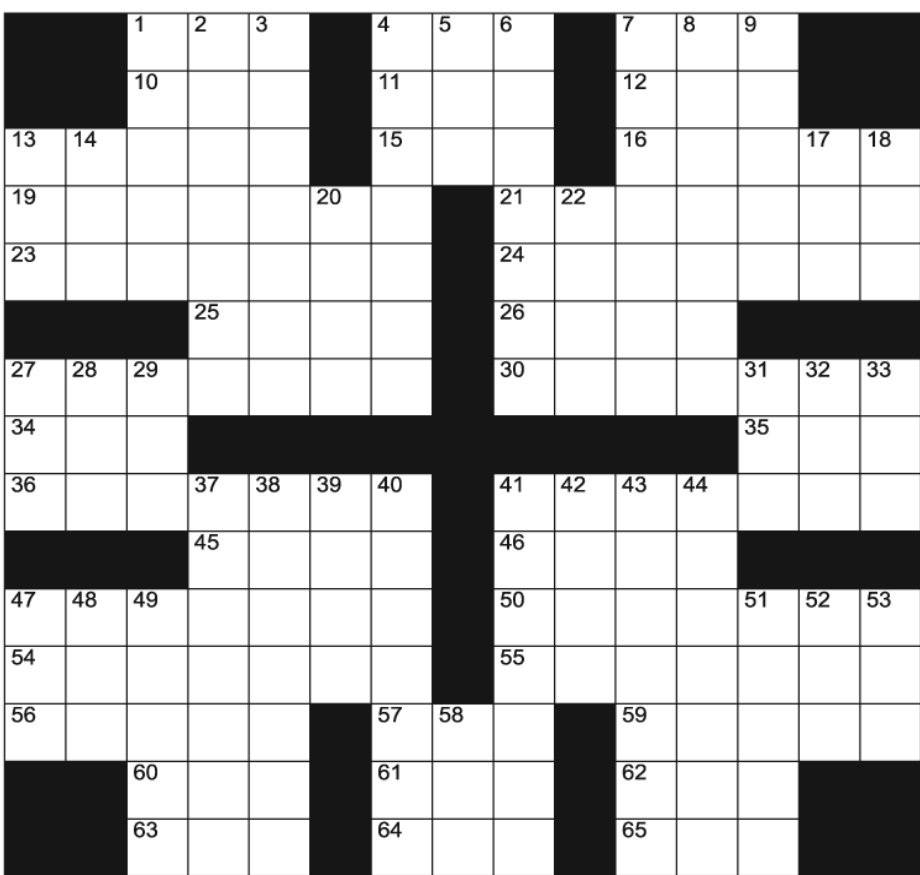
